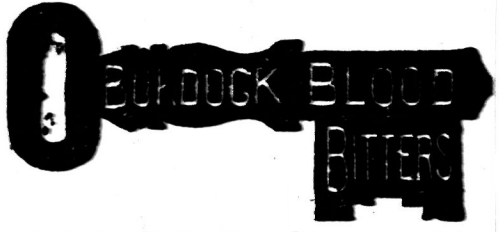


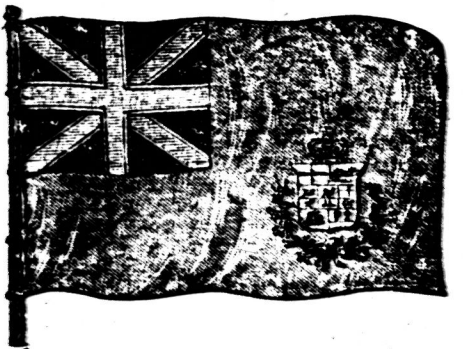

Our Poultry and Eggs.

The following are extracts from the report made by Mr. John Sanders, of Kempsville, Ont., in regard to egg and poultry shipments to Great Britain. It will be printed and issued by the Finance Department, in the form of a bulletin, in the course of a few days:

A GOOD MARKET FOR TURKEYS.

Turkeys can be placed on the British market at any time from the 1st of December to the 1st of March; and, from what information I could obtain, geese hold their value in the English market after the holiday season for a longer time than in the United States market, a fact of considerable importance in that line of goods, as after the holidays they are always almost valueless in the American market, being in this respect quite different from turkeys. From all my observations I am strongly convinced that Canadian poultry will compare favorably with any I saw in the British market, both as to weight of birds and quality of flesh, and will only require to be brought to the attention of the consumer to ensure a ready demand. Taking all things into consideration, I am of the opinion that Liverpool would be the best point for distribution, as within a radius of 50 miles of that city there is a population of about 4,000,000 of people, sufficient to consume the whole Canadian product, without materially affecting the prices in the local markets. I found that the average wholesale prices for fowls at the time of my visit last month were: Geese, 9d. (about 12 cents) per pound; turkeys, 8d. (about 16 cents) per pound. I find on enquiry that the freight rate for dead poultry packed in cases, from Montreal to Liverpool, would be 40 per ton measurement of 40 cubic feet.

EGGS.

I find that the market in England for the consumption of eggs is unlimited as that for poultry. Canadian eggs can be placed on that market and find ready sale at any season of the year in which they can be delivered in good condition, except perhaps May and June, during which months there is always a very large supply of Spring eggs from the European countries. It will be seen by the trade returns that Great Britain imported for consumption 94,000,000 dozens of eggs, and the imports are each year rapidly increasing. Of this vast quantity Canada has in the past contributed practically nothing, and the 12,000,000 dozens, the amount of Canada's annual export, would not in any way injuriously affect the price in such a large market. I am satisfied from personal investigation, both of raw and cooked eggs, that as to size, weight and flavor the Canadian egg is equal on the average to any egg placed on the British market. On this point I would wish to be understood as speaking most emphatically. To meet the requirements of the market I would advise shippers as far as possible to make two assortments or classes of eggs; that is, shipping the larger and smaller eggs separately. On examination of shipments made from Canada, and arriving while I was there, I found them in good condition, the egg not injured in any way in transport. Before being requested by you to go to England on this mission, I had myself made a shipment of eggs, which were sold before my arrival. On them I realized a profit of at least one cent a dozen more than I could have got at that time in the United States market. I observed that nearly all the eggs placed on the British market from European countries were packed in long straw, usually bright and clean, but in a few instances not so. My own opinion is in favor of packing in clean cut straw, and from the experience I had some years ago I intend using it in future shipments.

The eggs should be packed in cases large enough to contain 12 long hundreds; that is, 120 dozen.

Early Lambs for Market.

In the rearing of early lambs the greatest difficulty that meets the shepherd is the trouble that arises over weakly lambs. If, however, the ewes have been given proper care, and have kept in good thriving condition, there is seldom much trouble with the lambs. The lambing folds must be comfortable dry and moderately warm. Unless the fold is so protected that the rigors of late February or early March fail to affect the lambs, there is but little hope in having them on the market in such condition as to command the best prices. In attending weak lambs it is best to never take the lamb away from the ewe, as great difficulty will oftentimes arise in persuading her to own it again. The ewes should be fed well and given every care. It is advisable to shear them as early in the season as possible. A marked improvement in the growth of the lambs is sure to result if the ewes are shorn in April or early in May. The sustenance which they had to give to a heavy fleece, they are now able to give to the lambs, and further, shearing early is one of the best means available for keeping ticks from passing from the ewes to the lambs.

The young lambs must be pushed ahead as rapidly as possible. A plan sometimes adopted in the case of twins, is to send one to market at a couple of months of age, and keep the other on the ewe and dispose of it in the fall. In this way the trouble of weaning is greatly lessened. The best system to follow in feeding early lambs is to have a separate pen for them, close by the large pen, with an entrance so small that only the lambs can enter. In a trough in this pen keep a small quantity of chopped stuff and some clover hay in a small rack. Lambs have a great fondness for the clover heads which sometimes gather on the floor where the hay falls, and if these can be given them, it makes a splendid addition to their ration. In a short while they will visit this pen frequently. They should be encouraged in this by feeding them the choicest bits of clover hay and the best of other food. When about three or four weeks old they should be docked, and a little later, castrated. Lambs given the above care and food should tip the scale beam at forty or fifty pounds when about six or eight weeks old. They are then fit for the first market. Lambs in as good condition as these would be, should have no difficulty in bringing five or even six dollars apiece if offered during the forepart of May.—The Canadian Live Stock and Farm Journal for December.
