The Empress of Germany has given birth to another son. The Burton block in Chicago was burned last night. Loss, \$80,000.

Adolphe Belot, the French dramatist and novelist, is dead. He was born in 1829.

Leopold Meyers & Co., clothing dealers, of Chicago, have failed. Liabilities large.

Mr. Asa Miller, of Malahide, has been appointed license inspector for East Elgin.

Dr. Medley, the metropolitan bishop of Canada celebrated his 87th birthday Friday.

During the season of 1890 2,079,770 tons of coal were shipped by lake from Buffalo.

The Ontario Fruit Grower's Association concluded the annual convention at Hamilton Thursday.

All the Union Pacific switchmen at Rawlins, Wyo., are on strike and only mail trains are moving.

Sir George Baden-Powell has expressed his belief that the Behring's sea dispute will be settled this winter.

H. H. Funk, a stockman and speculator, has assigned at Shelbyville, Ill. Liabilities, \$100,000; assets, \$50,000.

Mr. Bulfour, chief secretary for Ireland, has started for Dublin, where he will remain during the Christmas holidays.

The U. S. Senate is discussing the desirability of establishing a fish hatchery in northern New York, near the St. Lawrence.

The most terrific snowstorm for six years has been raging for 24 hours at Wheeling, W. Va., and a large amount of damage has resulted.

The steamer Majestic, which arrived at New York from Liverpool Thursday brought several million dollars in gold to New York bankers.

At Bellefonte, Pa., the snow is 24 inches deep on the level. Trains are all delayed on the Pennsylvania railroad. The weather is very cold.

Antonio Guerrero, the Jack the Ripper of the City of Mexico, has been convicted of eight murders and 14 outrages on women, and sentenced to death.

Dexter says it was an accident. The young man was arrested charged with obtaining money under false pretences. The bullet entered his head above the eye, making a painful and dangerous wound. The complainant in the case was Fanny Joiner, cook at the Albion hotel, and the amount involved \$80.

Two thousand Irishmen at a meeting in the Cooper Institute, New York, Friday passed a series of resolutions endorsing Parnell.

A portion of the Cunard wharf at Halifax collapsed Friday and seven men were carried down to death, and the list may be increased.

In consequence of Parnell's speeches the Queen's proctor is reviewing all the documents submitted in evidence in the O'Shea divorce case.

Davitt says Parnell was only pelted with flour and mud at Castle Corner. Two doctors, however, swear that it was lime that was thrown.

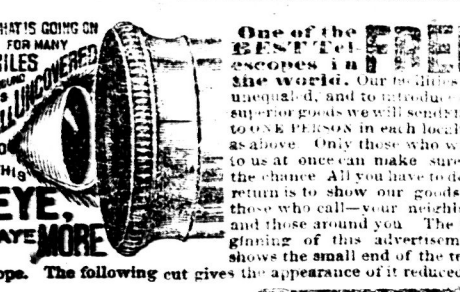
