#### A General Epitome of Events of the Week.

At the Cape Breton mines 745,000 tons of coal were produced during 1889.

There were 36 failures in British Columbia last year. The liabilities aggregated \$163,000 and the assets \$132,457.

Christmas day passed off very quietly in Canada, receiving general recognition in the churches and at festive gatherings at the family circle.

Gov. Beaver, of Pennsylvania, has issued a proclamation congratulating the people on a reduction of \$41,950 in the State debt during the past year.

There was an uprising in favour of Monarchy in Rio Janeiro on the 18th inst. which was only suppressed after hard fighting and loss of life on the 20th.

Influenza prevails to such an extent among the soldiers in the garrison at Lisbon, that it will probably prevent the proposed review on the 25th inst.

Mr. Frederick Weyerhaeuser, of Milwaukee, has an interest in the Banff coal mines. He says the company can mine a thousand tons of anthracite a day for 200 years.

It is reported that the dispute between England and Portugal regarding their African possessions will be submitted to Duke Ernest of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha for arbitration.

Mr. Gerald, Assistant Commissioner of Inland Revenue at Ottawa, estimates that 45,000,000 cigarettes were consumed last year. The home product was 22,705,000, an increase of fourteen millions over the product in 1888.

Christmas day was observed in old-fashioned English style at Rideau hall, the Governor-General entertaining a large family party. The festive season will begin at Government house with a brilliant observance of Twelfth night.

The "Montreal Underground Conduit Company" is the name of a concern which proposes to obtain from the Legislature a forty years' monopoly of the right to provide subways for telegraph, telephone, light, and all other electric wires and cables in the city of Montreal and surrounding municipalities.

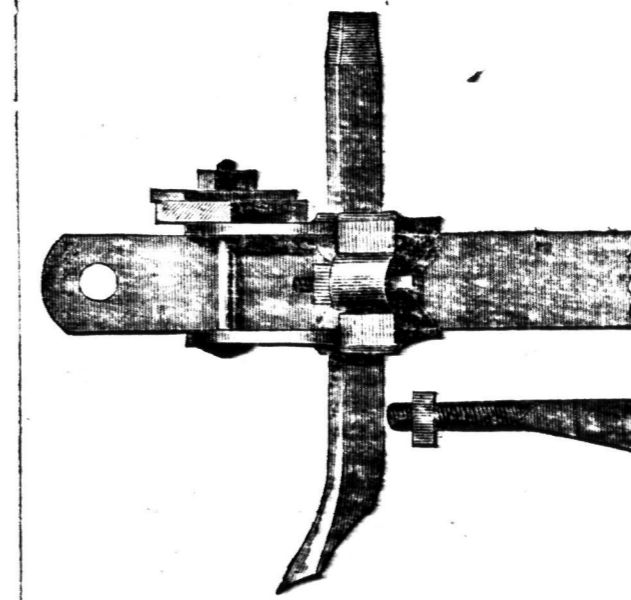
