## CURRENT NOTES.

The Dominion Parliament will meet on the 16th inst.

The Ontario Legislature has been called to meet on the 30th inst.

According to the Boston Herald, the people of that city have consumed over 2,000,000 quinine pills, or about a ton weight, during the past ten days. This is the greater quantity than the city ordinarily consumes in a year. Should a proportionate increase in the demand for the drug take place in other cities, there will be a marked rise in the price of quinine.

On every dollar's worth of plate glass that was imported into the United States last year a tax of a dollar and forty-four cents was levied. The value of the glass imported was \$481,792, and the duties amounted to \$493,790. On some kinds of common window glass too, a duty of 115 per cent, is levied. Nevertheless, the home manufacturers are not satisfied with the enormous profits they are thus enabled to make, but are now combining to raise prices. If some one were to make them a present of the earth they would probably set to work at once to secure a few of the neighboring planets as well.

The wheat producer has to face an increasing competition, which makes him anxious to keep possession of the market he has already got. Russia is doing her utmost to develop her grain trade, so that America and India and Australia shall not drive her completely out. Elevators and magazines on the American principle are being constructed at Odessa, Liban, St. Petersburg and other places, and railway tariffs are being considerably reduced. New canals and harbors are being constructed in different parts of the empire, and several important railway undertakings will shortly be commenced.

During the past year the amount of money embezzled from corporations, private firms, and the Government in the United States amounted to no less than \$8,592,753. When compared with the total amount of the funds placed in charge of employees throughout the country this sum does not seem large, and yet it shows that dishonesty prevailed to an extraordinary degree during the year. It is more than half as large as the published aggregate of the embezzlements which took place in the six years 1878-83, though it is only fair to say that the lifts for these years were not as complete as that for 1889. It would be interesting to know how many of last year's embezzlers fled to Canada.

Another State Governor has recommended the taxation of inheritances. In his recent message to his Legislature Governor Hill of New York, in which state legacies are now taxed, dealt briefly with the necessity for some new system of taxation of personal property. Continuing he said:—"It is respectfully suggested as worthy of the consideration of the Legislature whether a satisfactory solution of the problem of taxing personal property may not be found in a graduated probate and succession tax upon the personal property of decedents, developing into a complete system the theory of the collateral inheritance tax. Already most estates of decedents are carefully appraised by disinterested parties through the machinery of our surrogates' courts. Without going into details, it seems possible to devise a system requiring all estates of decedents over a certain valuation to be administered in a surrogate's court. At

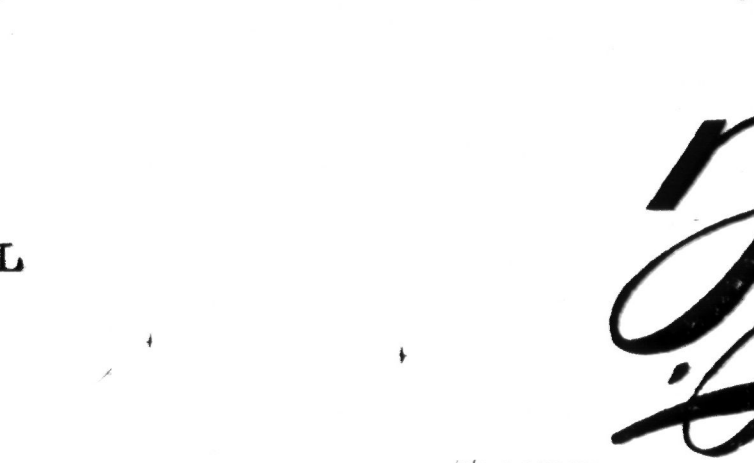
