The local Grand Trunk train from Actonville to Montreal was approaching St. Hilda Monday morning, when the cars were blown from the track. The conductor, brakeman, mail clerk and three passengers were seriously wounded, but no one was killed. Some of the cars took fire and were burned.

John Moore, the young Glanford farmer who was accused of killing Reuben Shoupe, the Michigan Central telegraph operator at Hagersville, who was clubbed in a row at Glanford station on the night of Sept. 13, was found guilty of manslaughter at Hamilton on Monday and sentenced by Judge McMahon to seven years in penitentiary.

Mr. Jas. Butcher, of Walpole, carried off nineteen prizes on his chickens at the Milton Poultry Show held on Monday and Tuesday, Dec. 30 and 31, and Wednesday, Jan. 1st. He secured four firsts, three seconds and two thirds on Wyandottes; two firsts, three seconds and one third on Houdans; two seconds and one third on Hamburgs; and one third on Plymouth Rocks.

A meeting of Haldimand Farmer's Institute will be held in the Town Hall, Selkirk, when the following sessions will be held: Friday, 17th of January, at 1:30 and 7:30 p.m. F. C. Grenside, Prof. of Veterinary Science of the Agricultural College, Guelph, A. Lehmann, B.S.A., A. H. Pettit, Esq., and others will address the Institute on various subjects appertaining to agriculture. The musical part of the programme for the evening session will be furnished by the musical talent of Selkirk. Admission free.
