### Judge Livingstone Dead.

THE TOWN OF SIMCOE BEREFT OF A VALUABLE AND ESTEEMED CITIZEN.  
SIMCOE, Jan. 17.—This morning at seven o'clock Judge Livingstone died after a severe illness of two weeks.

Robert Thompson Livingstone, eldest son of the late Rev. Martin W. Livingstone, for many years pastor of the Presbyterian congregation of Simcoe and Lynedoch, was born at Musselburgh, near Edinburgh, Scotland, in 1837, and came to Canada at the age of 14. He had attended the Universities of Toronto, and continued his studies in the University of Toronto, graduated S. B. A. in 1862, was the silver medalist in Metaphysics and ethics, taught the Grammar Schools of Perth, county of Lanark, Bowmanville and Chatham, studied Law in the Simcoe office of L. R. McKim, and in the Toronto office of R. B. & Boyd. Deceased to the bar in 1868, entered into partnership with D. H. H. Q. C. M. P., and continued till his elevation to the bench on the death of the late Judge McMann in 1885. He was eminently successful in his profession, noted for profound thought and legal acumen, and his judgment was never called in question. He enjoyed the respect of all who knew him, irrespective of creed or politics, a thorough gentleman, uniformly courteous, quiet and unassuming in manner. He took a deep interest in education, and was chairman of the board of School trustees for seven years, was reeve and mayor of Simcoe, and deeply interested in the prosperity of the town. Prior to his elevation to the bench he took an active interest in politics, and was a thorough Conservative, consistent in principle. He married a daughter of Mr. George Jackson, of Simcoe, who died eight years ago. One son and two daughters survive him. His sudden death casts a gloom on the community at large, and leaves a blank in society which will not soon be filled.

A few weeks later, however, Miss Skinner's heart softened and the other day she started for Chicago, where the two were married. Great is the power of advertising.

It is now unlawful to shoot quail or partridges the season for quail shooting having expired on 15th December 1st; and that for shooting partridges ending on 1st of January instant. As it is intention of parties interested in the preservation of these fine quail birds to protect them as much as possible during the close season, parties caught shooting them after this will be prosecuted rigorously. The fine imposed by statute is from \$5.00 to \$25.00 for each bird or egg destroyed; the whole of which fine will be paid to the informer; so that it will pay any farmer well to see that the law is observed, to inform on any one caught shooting these birds after this date; and it will also give the birds a chance to be plentiful for the next season, as there are plenty left to breed from.
