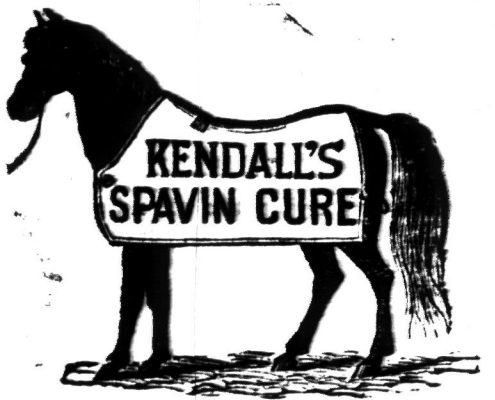

## CURRENT NOTES.

The immigration to Manitoba and North-West Territories the past year showed a considerable increase over the previous year. The figures were—1888, 17,000; 1889, 22,000. The Province of Manitoba received the largest proportion. There is every indication that the number this year will be very greatly in excess of last year.

A late legal decision in Montreal deals a hard blow on the unfortunate man who happens to be a creditor. For calling on a person in a factory with a view to collect a debt, a Montreal man was condemned to pay a fine of \$1 as damages for the affront. The court held that the domicile of the debtor is the proper place to demand money that is owing. It further declared that to ask on the street for money that is due constitutes an assault. This ought to make running into debt a popular pastime.

British Columbia is a great fruit-growing province; but unhappily the market for its product is local, and therefore restricted. Last season large quantities of plums went to loss for the want of purchasers. There would appear to be but one way in which the Columbians can do justice to their yield and that is by treating it as they do salmon namely, by preserving it. But preserving means a large use of sugar, and sugar, owing to the tariff, is relatively dear. Were sugar cheap enough the preserving trade could be pushed profitably and an export business could be done. But the taxes which are imposed to sustain the sugar industry kill fruit industry.

The Economist, of London, England, states that the price of wheat will remain low for some time to come. The yield of the United Kingdom was about 76,000,000 bushels, and as the annual consumption, at five and a half bushels per head, is 200,000,000 bushels, the quantity required from outside sources will be \$135,000,000 bushels or thereabouts. Regarding the future, the Economist counsels the British farmers to make up their minds to adopt the cheapest methods of production, until the severity of the contest there, no longer waging abates to some extent, and then to re-prepare the soil which will fill to those who have proved themselves the fittest in the struggle for existence.

Justice is sometimes dispensed in a characteristic manner in the land of the stars and stripes. Lynch law has been and still is common in the wild Western States but a new amendment to the penal code has been virtually added by Judge Denbow of Wilkesbarre, Penn. One day last month he stripped of his coat in court and administered to George Shiner, convicted of wife-beating, a terrible thrashing, in the presence of two hundred spectators, and then sent him home to look after his family. Remouning the reach this exponent of the law of physical force gave notice that he proposed there for to punish. If wife-beaters who came before him in a similar fashion, adding "It is the best way to punish them: it saves costs to the country and is better than putting them in gaol and letting their families starve while they are there." A dose of the cat-o-nine-tails has been frequently suggested as a remedy for wife-beating but if all our judges acted in the same striking manner as the Wilkesbarre judge there would be no need of whipping-posts. It would be rather awkward, however, if the prisoner, instead of the judge, came off victorious in the physical encounter.
