KINGSTON DRY DOCK.

Corner Stone Laid by Sir John Macdonald -What the Dock is Like. The corner stone of the Kingston dry dock was laid at Kingston yesterday by Sir John Macdonald in the presence of a great multitude. The following is a description was raging there.

The dam The sides of the dock will be puilt up like stairs so as to form the suspe of a boat's hull and aford rests for beams to keep vessels firm after the water is pumped out. Mr. Conley was compelled to go to since October last arranging and cutting stone. All the stone is now ready and a large consignment is on hand for early operations. Had he been able to get the required material here it would have meant to him a saving of \$10,000. One hundred iron box, which will slide across the front of the cavity and into a niche on the oppolake side will press it so tightly against the padding that leakage will be prevented. It forms a water tight compartment. The reason that the gate is a box is this: If anything goes wrong with the side next the dock it can be repaired, while the outer when it recedes it goes into a large cavity, which is a little dock in itself, and permits of being pumped out, so that the gate can be overhauled. The contrivance is a good one, and is said to work admirably. The "first stone," which will always be visible, is 6x3x3 feet It weighs over six tons, and was cut by Edward Doherty, of Belleville. All the stones in the mason work are the same size. There will be six drains beneath the floor of the dock. The floor will be made of eighteen inches of cement and then three feet of stone. At the entrance there will be a rudderwell, the first of the kind built, where boats can ship their rudders. This is an invention of Mr. Perley, Chief Engineer of the Public Works Departmen. Running about one hundred yards from each side of the dock will be a wharf, consequently vessels can be handled, let the weather be as boisterous as it will. Experiments in instantaneous photography have proved to us that the shot not only spread cut, comet-like, as they fly, but they string out one behind the other to a much greater distance than they spread. Thus, with a cylinder gun, when the first shot of a charge reaches a target that is forty yards away, the last shot is lagging along ten yards behind. Even with the choke-bore gun some of the shot will lag behind eight yards in forty. This accounts for the wide swath that is mown in a flock of ducks on which a charge of shot falls just right.
