NEWS FROM ALL POINTS.

A General Epitome of Events of the Week.

ITEMS OF INTEREST IN CONDENSED FORM.

The three children of John Kaufman were drowned in the river at Medford, Minn., on Tuesday.

At Yates Centre, Kan., a man called Coe shot his two brothers-in-law and his wife and then shot himself.

Lieutenant Governor McLelan, of Nova Scotia, died in Halifax Thursday morning.

Louise Michel, the French Communist, says she intends going to America to found a Nihilist colony.

The boiler explosion near Colchester, Ont., on Tuesday, was caused, according to the inquest, by a defective boiler.

The alleged revolution in Mexico is said to have been only an effort of a gang of bandits to do wholesale robbery.

Thursday afternoon six foundation stones of the new Ingersoll Baptist church were laid with appropriate ceremonies.

The Egyptian Council has decided to prohibit the cultivation of tobacco throughout Egypt and to increase the import duty.

There was a frightful explosion in a stove mill at North Star, Michigan, on Thursday, in which four men were killed and fourteen injured.

A number of Buffalo bicyclists have been arrested for riding on the sidewalks, contrary to a city by-law. The arrests were to make a test case.

The wheelhouse of a barge was picked up on Lake Huron 30 miles west of Southampton. It evidently belonged to a boat that has gone down.

Mrs. Henry Leach is suing the Grand Trunk Railway for \$100,000 damages for the death of her husband, who was killed at a crossing in Toronto.

The official count for the late provincial election for the District of Parry Sound was made Wednesday. Mr. Sharp's majority was declared to be 110.

The directors of the Vanderbilt roads Wednesday declared the following dividends:—Lake Shore, 2 per cent.; Michigan Central, 2 per cent.; Canada Southern, 1 1/2 per cent.

The Russian newspapers are angry over the cession of Heligoland to Germany. They fear the possession of this island by Germany will hamper Russian naval operations.

The sum of \$52,000 has so far been raised towards the building of the French-Canadian National monument, and subscriptions are still reaching the committee in Montreal.

On Wednesday the heat in Chicago was intense, and five deaths from sunstroke are reported. The mercury registered from 98 to 102 degrees in various parts of the State.

The Washington Treasury has decided that as electricity is an invisible, subtle agent or power, possessing no substance, as a merchantile commodity, it is not liable to duty.

In St. Ann's church, Montreal, Thursday morning the annual solemn requiem mass was offered for the repose of the souls of the thousands of victims of the ship fever of 1847.

The carpenters' strike which has been in progress in Philadelphia since May 1 is virtually at an end, and the men who have been holding out for 35 cents per hour will take work at the best terms they can get.

It is understood that Premier Macier will proceed shortly to France to consolidate the provincial debt and to obtain the services of M. Eiffel to superintend the construction of the Quebec bridge.

Department of Railway and Canals.

Mr. L. D. Dion, a prominent member of the above department, Ottawa, writes: I am very glad to give you today a few lines to say that I have recovered my health from which I have suffered for nearly three years.

There were two drowning accidents at Montreal on Thursday. Two young lads were the victims.

Martin Gillem, at Hamilton Thursday, saved a little girl from drowning. He is said to have saved twelve or fifteen lives.

L. B. Meyers, Kansas City, Mo., in a drunken fury tried to kill his wife. He wounded his uncle and his cousin fatally and shot a pursuer.

The men who become suddenly rich remind us of whales. They no sooner get to the top than they commence blowing.

The sculling race between William O'Connor, the Canadian oarsman and Stansbury took place on the Paramatta River, and was won by Stansbury.

A bill will probably pass the State of Louisiana Legislature and Senate to submit a change in the constitution granting lottery privileges for \$1,250,000 to Mr. Morris.

It is reported that Prince Bismarck, referring to the Anglo-American agreement, said that England looked well after her own interests, and that sooner or later her merchants would try to oust the Germans from Africa.

The Washington correspondent of The Mail gives a very interesting chapter in the inner history of the Behring Sea negotiations.

It appears that the conduct of the negotiations was taken out of Secretary Blaine's hands at the instance of the new Alaskan Company, and orders were issued that all vessels of foreign nations were to be seized, searched, and disarmed, believing that England would do nothing more than protest, but Lord Salisbury spoiled this calculation by ordering armed vessels to Behring's Sea. As a result the warlike orders to the American gunboats were withdrawn and the control of the negotiations has been restored to Secretary Blaine.
