A General Epitome of Events of the Week.

ITEMS OF INTEREST IN CONDENSED FORM.

It is stated Gen. Hypolite will be recognized President of Hayti by the European powers on the 15th inst.

It is officially stated that President Menendez, of San Salvador, was assassinated, and did not die natural death.

M. Marinkoviss, the Servian consul at Pristina, Roumelia, has been murdered.

Heavy rainstorms have done much damage in the interior of Austria and in parts of Germany.

Prof. William Elliot, Jr., President of the Baltimore City College, died on Tuesday night.

All but \$6,500 of the capital stock of the New York and New Jersey bridge has been subscribed.

Haverhill, Mass., began Thursday, with much ceremony, a two day's celebration of the 220th anniversary of its settlement.

The cool wave struck Chicago on Tuesday night. There was a drop in the temperature of nearly twenty degrees in twenty-four hours.

It is stated Prince Bismark has begged the Emperor to discontinue the project of erecting a bismark monument during the Prince's life.

Mr. John Page, Chief Engineer of Government Canals died suddenly in his apartment in Ottawa Wednesday morning. He was 74 years of age.

A call has been formally issued at Winnipeg for the formation of a Manitoba branch of the Equal Rights party and a convention to be held on July 12.

On Monday the graduating class of the Rockwood training school for asylum nurses received diplomas. They are the first trained asylum nurses in Canada.

One of the biggest prizes of the American turf was won Friday at Sheepshead Bay. It was the Realization Stakes, worth \$40,000. The race itself was however a farce, the winner coming in thirty lengths ahead.

At a special meeting of the St. Catharines and Niagara Central railway, the capital stock of the company was increased from \$300,000 to \$1,000,000. The directors assured the shareholders that the line would be built to Toronto at an early date.

The election at Barrow-in-Furness Friday resulted in favor of Mr. Duncan, Gladstonian who obtained 1,290 votes to 1,562 for Mr. Wainwright, Conservative, and Mr. Cairne, who resigned to test his constituency on the licensing clause of the Local Tax bill, obtained only 1,280 votes.

Mr. Mercier, in his speech last night before the Club National, in Montreal, coolly suggests that the Dominion Government should assume the debt of Quebec, thus relieving the province of the annual interest, amounting to \$1,000,000, which could be applied to colonization, Public schools, and charitable institutions.

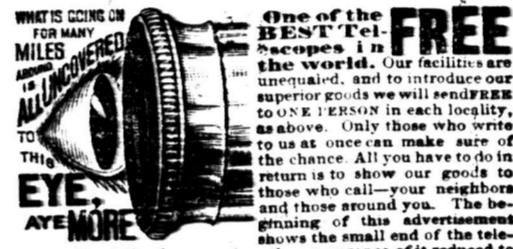

Selling Lottery Privileges.

LOUISIANA STATE WILL MAKE MONEY OUT OF IT.

The Lottery Bill, which passed the House last week, is an act providing for submission to the people of an amendment to the constitution inserting therein an article on levees, schools, charities, pensions, drainage and lotteries embodying a contract with John A. Morris and associates by which they agree to pay the State \$1,000,000 per annum:—For levees \$350,000; drainage in the City of New Orleans, \$100,000; for charities and pensions, \$500,000. Before the bill was finally passed an amendment eliminating the monopoly features of the bill was adopted. It is understood the Senate will amend the bill by increasing the amount to be paid by Morris to \$1,250,000 per annum and that the friends of the measure in the House will accept the amendment. Amendments to the constitution require a two-thirds vote before they can be submitted to the people. It is believed the bill will pass the Senate with the amendment above mentioned. Mr. Morris has agreed, if the measure is finally adopted, to advance the State \$1,000,000 in 1890 and \$1,000,000 in 1891 for levee purposes, enabling the State to reconstruct her broken levees and raise the grade of all to the height required for the protection of the alluvial lands of the State from overflow.
