 A BIG APPLE TREE.—In the township of Pelham, near St. Catharines, is a monster apple tree about 100 years old that commenced bearing in the year 1793. It is on Mr. Beckett's farm and measures 10 feet 5 inches around the trunk. In 1888 it produced 21 barrels of apples.

O'Carra, a sister of Mrs. Counter also came on the same train from Chicago. The funeral took place on Wednesday afternoon from Rose Hill the family residence, to Oakwood Cemetery. The attendance was large and all felt the greatest sympathy at his untimely death. To Mr. and Mrs. Counter and their family we extend our sympathy in this one of the darkest hours of their existence, and we are certain that there is no one in the neighborhood but who has the deepest feeling of condolence for them in their bereavement.—Reformer, Simcoe.
