Garnet Gatherings.

The hay which was a very heavy crop, is nearly all cut and stored away for winter.

We are having very warm weather. During the thunder-storm last Tuesday a number of telegraph poles were struck by lightning near here.

Garnet L. O. L. No. 714 attended Port Dover on the 12th.

Mrs. Seord is very sick again.

Mrs. Wm. Poole, of Toronto, is the guest of Mr. Jas. Guthrie.

Raspberries are ripe and are reported to be a good crop.

Wheat is nearly ready for the binder.

The strike of the London letter carriers has practically collapsed.

The cholera returns from Valencia show a steady decrease in the epidemic.

Notwithstanding his illness Mr. Stanley was married on Saturday in Westminster Abbey to Miss Dorothy Tennant.

Mr. David Pugh, M.P. for the eastern division of Carmarthenshire, is dead. He was a Liberal, and favored Home Rule for Ireland.

A fearful fire broke out in the Stamboul quarter of Constantinople on Saturday, and fully one thousand houses and shops were destroyed.

Dr. O'Reilly, Inspector of Prisons and Public Charities, who was attacked with paralysis a couple of days ago at Kingston, died on Saturday night at ten o'clock.

The Prince of Wales on Saturday inaugurated the Bisley rifle meeting, the successor of the Wimbledon meeting. The Princess of Wales fired the first shot.

Archbishop Walsh is said to have received a cheque for \$5,000 as his fee for marrying Mr. W. A. Murry, and Mrs. Sarah Cawthra at Toronto last week.

The house in Quebec where the body of General Montgomery was laid out in 1776 has been pulled down by the proprietor who intends erecting a fine residence on the site.

Rear Admiral Werner publishes an article on the importance of Heligoland to Germany, making the blockade of the coast impossible, and pointing out the necessity of building a new iron-clad fleet.

An old soldier, who was arrested the other day in Little Rock, Ark., for circulating counterfeit money, was found to have utilized a hollow in his wooden leg as a receptacle for his imitation bills.

Mr. Achille Carriere, the Mercier candidate, defeated Mr. Flynn in Gaspe on Saturday by about forty votes.

Mr. Flynn's defeat is a severe blow to the Conservatives, as he would undoubtedly have been a leader of the Opposition had he been elected.

During his speech in the House of Commons on Friday night Mr. Parnell suggested the appointment of a Board of Arbitration for the settlement of disputes between landlords and tenants in Ireland, and Secretary Balfour appeared to be favorably impressed by the idea.

In the St. Vincent de Paul penitentiary on Friday evening Joseph Dominois alias Cusson, who has been wandering round the country in the guise of a priest, and who was sentenced to two years' imprisonment for assaulting little girls, was given a very severe flogging.

The fishes were laid out with the vigor that the circumstances of the case demanded.

The Deer shooting case of the Long Point Co. against Anderson has been at length finally decided after three trials in favor of Mr. Anderson, very briefly the case is this: The whole of Long Point is owned by the Co. of that name, except about 100 acres purchased, when the Point was sold out in blocks by the Government, by Mr. Walter H. Anderson.

He declined absolutely to sell his land to the Co. even at a high valuation. The Co. desiring very much the whole of it for game purposes. They put on the island in 74 some 12 deer imported from the States, setting them free. In '81 Anderson set free 3 deer on his land, there being no fences anywhere. Early in the year Anderson shot some deer on his land claiming he had a right to do so. The Co. sued him in the Division Court at Victoria on March 10th, and got judgment in their favor, Anderson appealed to higher court and the appeal was dismissed. Not satisfied with this decision Mr. Anderson took the matter to Osgoode Hall, before a full bench of judges, who decided the case in favor of Mr. Anderson with full costs. This decision leaves both the Co. and Mr. Anderson free to shoot all the deer they can in season on their respective properties. The case excited keen interest on the shores of Long Point Bay and the people are satisfied with the final judgment.

The Simcoe Races, to be held on 29th and 30th July, will be worth seeing. The first day takes in the 3:00 trotting stake for \$250, with 6 entries; Free for all trotters and pacers, purse \$200, and the Norfolk County colt stakes for foals of 1887, \$25 each, 12 entries have made good their second payment. The second day takes in the 2:40 trotting stake for \$250 with 7 entries, and a green race for \$150 for horses (trotters only) owned in the counties of Norfolk, Oxford, Brant and Haldimand that have never started in a race prior to 23rd of June, 1890. The Simcoe track is conceded to be the best half mile track in Canada. Entries for the free for all and green trot close on 24th July, and should be addressed to J. C. Boyd at Simcoe.
