### NEWS FROM ALL POINTS.

#### A General Epitome of Events of the Week.

##### ITEMS OF INTEREST IN CONDENSED FORM.

Miniard's Liniment cures Diphtheria. Dr. Peters, the German explorer, has reached the coast of Africa. He is well.

The Ontario Prison Reform Commission commenced its work in Hamilton yesterday.

The corner-stone of the new high school at Meaford was laid yesterday with Masonic honors.

The Paris Board of Health declares there has not been a single case of cholera in France this summer.

Referring to the illness of the Pope, the Montreal Witness nominates Cardinal Taschereau as his successor.

The Toronto Baseball Club was disbanded Wednesday owing to the dissolution of the International League.

The Russian newspapers approve of the sentences passed on the nihilists arrested and convicted in Paris.

A terrific cyclone has prevailed in Muscat, Arabia, and neighborhood, and it is reported that over 700 persons were killed.

The Montreal assessors have nearly completed the census, and it is estimated that the population of the city and suburbs is 227,700.

The new Spanish Cabinet has announced its intention of giving decided and sincere protection to the natural production of Spain.

The new organ for Notre Dame, Montreal, one of the largest on the continent, will be set up about the end of this month. It will cost \$50,000.

The twenty-fourth annual meeting of the Grand National Curling Club of America was held in Toronto on Friday. Twenty-five delegates were present.

The petition against the return of Mr. Stinson as member for Hamilton in the Local Legislature was filed in Toronto Thursday morning. The charges are bribery and treating.

The letter carriers attached to the Central office in London struck Wednesday; but on learning that Postmaster-General Raikes was absent they resumed work until he replies to their complaint. The men attached to the Eastern Central office have also struck.

#### CURRENT NOTES.

Last Friday week the Provincial election petition of Benjamin Birdsall, Esq., President of the South Norfolk Liberal Conservative Association, against the return of William A. Charlton, Esq., for South Norfolk, was lodged with Mr. Grant, Registrar of the Court of Appeal at Toronto. Bribery and corruption is the substance of the allegation of the petitioner. A writ was also served on Mr. Charlton on the same day.

Col. Walker Powell, adjutant-General, and one of the most popular as well as efficient officers of the Government, will temporarily fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Gen. Middleton, as he has done at different times in the past. Sir Frederick's Imperial pension is \$3,500.

On behalf of Dr. Montague, M. P., before Mr. Justice Ross at Osgeooke Hall Friday week, Mr. W. M. Douglas, moved for particulars of all charges of bribery and fraud which were to be made against his client on next trial of the Haldimand election case. Mr. E. D. Armour, acting for the plaintiff, agreed, and the order was entered.

The coroner's jury which has been investigating the recent Grand Trunk railway disaster at Copetown has arrived at the following ungrammatical verdict:—"That the jury are of opinion that the accident was probably due to the expansion of the rails and the great heat of the sun on a portion of the road-bed under repairs, which condition of the road-bed we think may have probably contributed to the accident."

Gen. James W. Denver, after whom the city of Denver was named, is a law partner of ex-Attorney General Garland. He is hale and hearty at the age of seventy.

Garfield's saying that "an ounce of pluck is worth a pound of luck," does not apply to betting on races.

Forepaugh, Birnum and Sam Jones have mutually agreed to take different sections of the country this year.

"Some put their trust in horses some in chariots," but the worse trust yet is that which is attempting to get a firm footing on ice.

A protest was entered Thursday morning against the election of Mr. Richard Tooley from East Middlesex.

The Buenos Ayrean, which has arrived at Montreal from Glasgow, brought over 200 Icelandic immigrants, who propose joining the colony of their fellow-countrymen already established in Southern Manitoba.

Mr. Samuel Blake, Q.C., of Toronto, and Messrs. George T. Brown and Edward Cronin, of London, while proceeding in a steam yacht to Murray bay, had a narrow escape from death on Tuesday. When opposite Gananouque the boiler exploded and the yacht took fire. They were rescued by a tug, and proceeded by train next day to Montreal.
