A serious accident occurred on the farm of D. A. Wooley, three miles north of Springhill, one day last week. As Hugh Douglas, a neighboring farmer, was standing inside an enclosure, where Mr. Wooley keeps his bull, the animal made a sudden rush at him. Mr. Douglas being unable to get out of the way, attempted to catch the animal by the neck, and thus keep himself from coming in contact with the horns of the enraged brute. One of the horns however, entered the upper part of the cheek, and penetrating through the flesh, entered his mouth. If it had not been for the presence of mind of Mr. Wooley, who rushed into the enclosure at the risk of his own life, and dealt the animal a number of kicks, Mr. Douglas might have been fatally injured. A doctor used nine stitches to close the wound.

On the afternoon of Dominion Day about three o'clock, an extra west bound freight ran into No. 11 way freight also west bound, between Port Dover Junction and Windham Centre on the M.C.R. It seems the way freight was stopped on the track, and the extra freight was flagged, but for some reason not yet known the extra freight was not stopped before it had struck the caboose of the way freight. Mr. E. K. Evans, formerly of the mechanical department of the St. Thomas Journal, but now of St. Mary's, and his wife and child were in the caboose, but jumped when they saw the other train would strike it. The embankment is steep at this point, and in jumping, Mr. Evans and the child, whom he took in his arms, received some slight injuries. Mrs. Evans escaped unhurt. The way freight was loaded with coal and lumber, and seven of the cars were wrecked. A wrecking crew came down from St. Thomas, and the track was cleared about seven o'clock at night. In the meantime passenger trains on the M.C.R. were sent over the Air Line between St. Thomas and Canfield.
