Dr. Christian F. Peters, the astronomer, was found dead in his bed at Clinton, N. Y., Saturday morning.

The trunk line passenger agents have offered the commission to Mr. L. P. Farmer, of the Erie road.

J. W. Watson, a well known literary man, author of "Beautiful Snow," died in New York on Saturday, aged 68.

Harvest is about over in California and the yield of grain is reported much below the average in quantity, but good in quality.

Mr. Adam Brown, M.P. for Hamilton, has been appointed honorary commissioner to represent Canada at the Jamaica Exhibition.

A city of Mexico despatch says a battle has been fought between Guatemalans and San Salvadorians, in which the latter were victorious.

A Berlin despatch says during artillery practice at Jüterbogk on Saturday a large shell exploded and many artillerymen were wounded.

The steamship Thornholm, from Picton to Montreal, is reported ashore on Barrett ledge rock in the St. Lawrence. Her lower compartments are full of water.

German critics say the French army never appeared to so great advantage as on July 14 on the celebration of the fall of the Bastille. They especially praise the artillery.

A man named John Brochu, formerly a member of B battery, Quebec, who deserted a year ago, has given himself up, stating the constant fear of arrest made his life unbearable.

George J. and Thomas F. Rice, brothers, had a rough and tumble fight at their home in St. Louis the other evening over a trifling affair, and the latter was so badly hurt that he died. George has been arrested.

Lydia Becker, leader of the woman's suffrage movement in England, died on Saturday at Geneva from diphtheria.

A lady in Kingston stepped on a rusty nail, lockjaw ensued and the whole body became rigid. Nourishment was administered by means of a clay pipe, the stem of which was inserted through the opening made by a lost tooth and now the patient is recovering.

B. F. Spinney, a business man of Colorado Springs, was kidnapped three weeks ago by a Texan who claimed that Spinney owed him \$2,000 for cattle. A brother-in-law started with money to pay the claim and he also has disappeared. It is believed the Texan has killed both.

In the death of Gen. Clinton B. Fisk the cause of prohibition loses one of its ablest and most prominent advocates. He was a man with a first-class record as a soldier, as a business man and as a citizen. His natural ability as a writer and speaker was increased by his sound education, an education which he acquired as the result of an arduous struggle against heavy odds of circumstances. He took an active interest not merely in temperance work but in the cause of religion and the cause of education. He was made the nominee of the prohibition party for the Presidency in 1888, and, though the only object of the vote was to allow prohibitionists to "stand up and be counted" without hope of affecting the result, Gen. Fisk's part in the campaign was well and honorably performed.

Stanley's wedding at Westminster Abbey on Saturday week seems to have been a fine affair. He was ill, but managed to bear up with the aid of a crutch. A cable despatch to a New York paper says he has now done with travelling, though he may go back to Africa as agent or governor of the Belgian territory. He is rich, and has secured as much fame as falls to the lot of most men. His last book sold well, and if he decides on taking to the lecture platform he will doubtless reap a further harvest. The only "dark continent" now left for explorers is the centre of Australia. Stanley has been consulted by some Melbourne people and has promised to furnish hints for the organization of a well-equipped expedition into that great Sahara. It was reported in the British House of Commons the other day by a member who knows Australia well, that if the water and irrigation problem in the interior could be solved there would be room for three hundred millions of people to live with a high degree of comfort.
