#### A General Epitome of Events of the Week.

##### ITEMS OF INTEREST IN CONDENSED FORM.

The Masonic Grand Lodge will meet in Toronto next year.

Advices from Chili state that the strikers in the whole region number 7,000.

The Prison Reform Commission opened its first meeting in Kingston Wednesday.

An American girl studying in Berlin committed suicide on Tuesday. Her mind was affected with over-study.

The complaints against Sir Adolphe Caron's maladministration of his department if not loud are deep and earnest.

The steamship Seguin was successfully launched at the shipyard of the Poison Iron Company at Owen Sound Wednesday.

The Queen Regent of Spain has started for San Sebastian, where it is expected she will be visited by the Prince of Wales.

The Grand Duchess Xenia eldest daughter of the Czar, will marry Grand Duke Alexander Mechalievitch, her second cousin.

The resolution of Senator Cullom relative to Canadian railways, after having been very materially amended, was passed Wednesday.

Stringent measures are being taken by the Russian authorities against the Jews, who are suspected of favouring the nihilists.

The dock laborers of Newcastle refuse to unload Danish vessels because the dock laborers of Copenhagen have gone on a strike.

A despatch from Leavenworth, Kansas, state that the first rain for 25 days, during which the heat was excessive, fell on Tuesday.

Documents have been distributed to the members of the French Chamber of Deputies to prove that France has preference rights to the Congo State.

Rev. Dr. Samuel Rose, one of the oldest and at one time most prominent ministers of the Methodist Church in Ontario, died at his residence in Toronto Wednesday.

Ex-Detective Richardson, who was prominently connected with the Guilford case and the arrests in connection with the shooting of Hackett, died Thursday in Montreal.

Premier Mercier, who is at present in Montreal, claims a clear majority of thirty, and says he will carry out the political programme outlined in his speech before the Club National.

William Griffin, a man of 80 years of age, was drowned at Bolton, Ont. Wednesday while trying to rescue his nine-year-old grandson, a Toronto lad, who was spending the school holidays with him.

The session of the Grand Masonic Lodge was opened Wednesday in Kingston with a very large attendance of delegates. W. Bro. Mayor Drenan welcomed the brethren to Kingston, after which Grand Master Walkem delivered his annual address.

Mr. J. Ross Robertson, of Toronto, has been elected grand master of Freemasons for Canada, and Hon. J. M. Gilson, of Hamilton, deputy grand master.

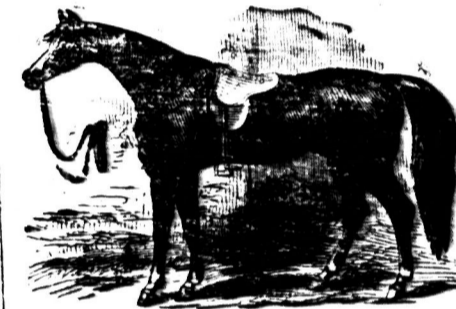
