Manitoulin Island.

To the Editor of the Jarvis Record:
The pleasures of trout fishing in crystal streams, winding among lofty hills and woody dells where the red deer wanders and the black bear loves to prowl have often been told by enthusiastic writers. All these delights are attainable on the Manitoulin with some drawbacks however. Where the trout are most plentiful the mosquitos are equally so. And when you get your line entangled in some overhanging branch or bush you are apt to make use of naughty words and the romance of the thing becomes somewhat obscure. And if you are not in love with laborious exercise for its own sake when you drag your weary way homeward at night with your treasure reputed worth \$1.00 per lb in the large cities you realize that they are only fish after all, and that as a paying business you would have been better engaged hoeing your potatoes.

Let me describe some sport however, which even a backwoodsman can appreciate at Lake Mindemoya. You arise in the morning ere the sun has cast its shadow over the still water over which the mists of morning are still hovering. As with a companion you pull out from shore a wild duck swims quickly away with her young brood, while various kinds of water fowl fly or swim around you, and a stately loon assures you with her doleful voice that he is going to catch the first fish as he dives beneath the surface. Away you go along the shore on the edge of the deep water carefully holding your trolling line so as to feel the throb of the revolving spoon. Suddenly there is a jerk! and you commence hauling in. What have you? Only a pickerel, you exclaim, as it rises to the surface and allows you to drag it in, its eyes and mouth wide open with astonishment. Again and again is this operation repeated until it becomes monotonous when varied as it generally is with a pike or a black bass, you have sport "fit for a Prince," a description of which so exciting and interesting would occupy too much space in your columns. (Occasionally you anchor your boat and pull in a dozen or two pickerel, rock bass and perch with the common hook and line. Home again in time for breakfast and the duties of the day.)

My son-in-law, Charles Howden, shot a young lynx lately. As it fell to the ground out of a tree the old one came up to it and licked it over, striving to bring it back to life. He fired at her wounding her badly. A young man caught another of the fittens an hour after about as large as a tame cat, but had to kill it as it was impossible to hold it. This occurred in the township of Campbell on one of my cedar lots, being the same one where I had a thrilling adventure with one of these species of animals recorded in the Record about three years ago.

A woman was detained a prisoner for two hours in a vacant house of mine on an adjoining lot, a large bear according to her story marching back and forth in front of the door. Another woman, Mrs. William Tegge, near my home in Carnarvon, encountered a bear in the road a short time ago.

A dangerous American counterfeit bill is circulating. The bill is an imitation of the two-dollar silver certificate. It purports to be of department series 1886, check letter B, 1863. The Hancock portrait is poorly executed, and the color of the seal is a bright brick red, instead of the dark red of the genuine bill. It may also be detected by the fact that the "i" in "Registrar" is not dotted, nor is the "t" in "States" crossed.
