To the Editor of the JARVIS RECORD:
Orangeism in its relation to the propagation and defence of the gospel, as set forth in a sermon preached in the Methodist church, Garnet, on Sunday, June 22nd, by the Rev. J. H. Robinson, of Hagersville, to the society of Orangemen.

Mr. Robinson chose for the scripture lesson, the second Chapter of the first Epistle General of Peter, and selected as his text Philipians 1-17, "I am set for the defence of the gospel."

Mr. Robinson, throughout the first part of his sermon, spoke in a very fair and dispassionate manner and kept himself moderately from the bitterness so often displayed in the discussion of questions relating to the Romish Church. The congregation throughout the whole discourse showed a degree of attention and interest, worthy of the great church to which they belong. Although all did not agree in the main with the speaker's remarks, yet such was the courteous and dignified attention given him that no visible expression of disapproval could be discovered in the countenance of those present.

Mr. Robinson in opening expressed himself as highly delighted with the honor done him by the orange brethren in inviting him to preach to them, saying that he was conscious of the importance and value of the society. He declared himself to be in sympathy with the principles of the organization, and in entire accord with their efforts to defend Protestant religion. This he asserted, was a ground upon which they might quarrel and wrangle among themselves, yet in a warfare waged against a common foe of their church and religion, they could fight side by side in a united battle for the cause of right.

The speaker went on to show where there were many good points in the Roman Catholic religion, such as belief in God, in the Trinity, in the Divinity of Christ, and in the Divinity of the Holy Spirit. On the other hand he pointed out the error of the church in prohibiting the laity from reading the Bible; the fallacy of the doctrine of transubstantiation, which teaches that the Priest by repeating the words, "Hoc est meum corpus," can turn the wafers into gods. He also exposed and ridiculed many other inconsistencies in the church, giving especial attention to the claim of an infallible church and priesthood, and to the aggressive, tyrannical, and secret policy, by which she extended her power and increased her numbers. He also showed that to day, as in the days of the Spanish Inquisition, the church of Rome possesses the spirit of intolerance, and where possible accomplishes her ends by persecution. He also showed that while openly they professed allegiance to their country and Queen, yet in secret, they were plotting her ruin. During his condemnation of Romish principles, the eloquent gentleman passed by turns from the sublime to the ridiculous, a species of oratory in which he seems to excel. While the speaker confined himself to a criticism of Romish doctrines, he elicited at least the silent approval of the audience, but when he passed to the consideration of some political questions, he forfeited the approval of at least some of his hearers. Touching upon the question of separate schools, he said that he greatly deplored their existence, but said, as did the great Liberal party at the last Provincial election, that the fault lay in their establishment, and that the blame should be imputed to the party that established them. The rev. gentleman admitted that since they were established, it was almost impossible to abolish them, and arguing by implication, that the best that could be done, was to make them as efficient as possible by good legislation. Mr. Robinson gave as the principal reason for the establishment of separate schools the fear of the Roman Catholics in having their children compete with Protestant children. It is the humble opinion of the writer, that the rev. gentleman is in error on this point. Separate schools were established mainly because Romanists believe in imparting religious instruction to their children, together with secular teaching. They believe that religion should be part of a child's education in school, while we insist that it should be strictly unsectarian. No doubt ours is the better system, but if they are honest in their opinion, it is a matter between God and themselves, and we should not judge them harshly. If we cannot persuade them to our belief, would it not be resorting to the tactics of the Spanish Inquisition, and to the practices of that barbarous and unenlightened age, if we were to arbitrarily compel them to accept our system? I will leave it to the students of Macaulay and Green to judge.

Passing to the Jesuits Estates Bill he took advantage of a good opportunity to pandor to the spirit of bigotry and intolerance, which permeates

Orangeism wherever it is found. The speaker characterized all those who voted against the disallowance of the Bill as representatives who had pondered to the Hierarchy of Rome, and consequently did not deserve the confidence and support of the people. Knowing that the Orangemen had vigorously opposed the return of Mr. Colter to the House of Commons, Mr. Robinson expressed his sympathy with the people in leaving at home at the last Dominion election in Haldimand, the man who had by his vote, courted the support of the Roman Catholic Hierarchy of Canada. Now, I think that such a statement is unfair in the extreme. A minister of Mr. Robinson's standing should have sufficient mental acumen to penetrate the schemes of those oily politicians who introduced that measure, or rather resolution of disallowance, into the House. He ought to have ascertained by this time that the resolution of disallowance, introduced into the House by designing politicians, was calculated and framed, with a shrewdness and cunning worthy of Machiavel, so as to bring against it the solid vote of the reform party in the House. I think that the rev. gentleman, in censuring the reform party for opposing disallowance on the ground that it would infringe on Provincial rights, is unaware that time and again, the highest loyal Tribunal in the British Empire, has decided that under the present constitution, the Ottawa Government has no power to veto any legislation that comes within the jurisdiction of the Provincial Legislature. Mr. Robinson's remarks seemed calculated to please the Orangemen, and I have no doubt he was successful. They will feel flattered to think that they are an organization, "set for the defence of the gospel," Mr. Robinson being their judge.

Dominion Day in Dunnville.

The 23rd anniversary of the confederation of the Provinces will be celebrated in Dunnville in regal style. An active committee of the Citizens, headed by Reeve Labor, has the management of the affair in hand, and posters announcing the programme are distributed about the Town. There will be a parade of the Dunnville Fire Department; athletic games, including an international tug of war between Dunnville and Buffalo; a football match for the County Championship between Attercliffe and South Cayuga clubs; an International Base Ball match between Dunnville and Buffalo clubs. There will also be Boat Races and River Sports on the Grand River. The Steamers "Mascotte" and "Niagara" will bring over 1,000 American visitors with two bands of music. The Grand Trunk R. R. will give special reduced rates from all stations to Dunnville on that day.
