It's Awfully Naughty, Girls.

REV. C. E. MANNING SAYS THAT DANCING IS IMMORAL, DEGRADING YET FASCINATING.

"Should Christians Dance" was the subject of Rev. C. E. Manning's sermon Sunday night, in Gerrard-street Methodist Church, Toronto. "Dancing," said the rev. gentleman, "is unfruitful work of darkness. It is immoral and degrading, and our young folks are, alas! beginning to regard it as a useful accomplishment. It has been said that the giddy whirls in the ball room are very fascinating. Whether or not this is the case I cannot say, but they should be done away with as soon as possible." Mr. Manning then quoted from the pastorals of Catholic bishops and from Presbyterian synod reports to show that Methodists were not the only class of people opposed to the attractions of the ballroom. He frowned upon polkas, waltzes and round dances, peered into ancient histories to find where ballet dancing originated, and pointed with pride and satisfaction to the dancing of David before King Saul. This, the rev. gentleman thought, was the proper way to dance, as it was all to the glory of God. The modern social dance originated in Athens hundreds of years ago, when dancing was attended with ever known vice; while the round dance originated in the low German saloons.

The preacher then gave his reasons why dancing is improper. They were many and in his estimation very strong. He had a decided objection to the delectable costume of the lady dancer. He also thought it was a bold and improper thing for a young man to place his arm around the waist of a young girl, and related the story of the young girl at the ball, who, when found in the conservatory by her mother with her partner's arm encircling her waist, exclaimed: "Oh, mamma, Mr. Young does not dance, so I thought I would give him a sitting-down waltz!" "I suppose," quietly observed the preacher, "that is where the fascination comes in." [Laughter.]

A Run on the "L's"

QUITE A COINCIDENCE IN THE BURCHELL-BENWELL CASE.

A reader of the New York World has discovered the curious fact that the letters "L" are found in nearly, if not all, the names connected with the famous Burchell-Benwell murder at Niagara Falls. This strange coincidence holds good with alleged murderer, victim, intended victim, counsel, magistrate and so on. It is also worth noting that double "L" occurs in the names of Maxwell and Preller, the famous St. Louis trunk tragedy, which so closely resembles in many respects the Niagara Falls murder.

Pickthall, supposed accomplice. Welland, Ont., jail where prisoner stays. Town Hall, Clifton, Ont., place of examination. Niagara Falls, place of apprehension. Hill, magistrate. Hellmuth, counsel. Fallon, witness. Halliday, witness. Kelley, witness. O'Farrell, witness. Mellerish, confederate in London. Rossall, former schoolmate. Mayall, late employer in London. Wallack, theatre he claimed to manage. Fall Assizes, when to be tried. Gallows, murderer's destination.
