**A Ball of Fire.**

The following letter from Scotland, Ont., we clip from the Globe of Tuesday:  
TO THE EDITOR: The appearance I st evening for the third time of a luminous ball of fire in the streets of this village induces me to ask yourself or some of your scientific correspondents a few practical questions. But, in order to explain myself, I will first give a short description of the 1st appearance of this phenomenon, as described by a reliable gentleman living near the Baptist church in this village: "On the evening of the 29th inst., as I was in a rear room of my residence without a light, I was surprised by the sudden illumination of the room to an extraordinary extent. I looked out of the window, and seeing a bright light a few rods up the street seized my hat and ran out to ascertain its cause. On nearing it, at a distance of about a rod, a luminous ball apparently about the size of my closed hand appeared, lying on the ground and bounding along the highway in front of me, making a hissing noise and sparkling each time it struck the earth and bounded along. I followed it and approached it, but, when within about two yards of it, it suddenly moved away northward at a very rapid pace, as fast or faster than a running horse, leaving a peculiar odor not unlike burning powder, and disappearing over the hills north of the church. The centre portion of the luminous body was of a very white color, like the calcium or electric light, and appeared to be without substance. This was surrounded by a bright red light, which in turn was enveloped by a voluminous of smoke. The wind was blowing strongly from the north at the time, and this went rapidly against the wind as I approached it. It was followed by both pedestrians and horsemen, but could not be overtaken.  
The locality where these balls have appeared three times within ten days is a sandy loam and gravelly soil, about forty rods from the cemetery, and about fifty rods from a spring coming out below the knoll on which the church and cemetery are situated.  
Can it be possible, Mr. Editor, that the phosphorated, carbonated or sub-

phurated hydrogen gases have travelled around through the base of the knoll a distance of forty or fifty rods without being disseminated; and becoming ignited, spontaneously producing the ignis fatuus so much dreaded by the superstitious of the olden times; and would either of these gases, or a mixture of them produce a light of sufficient brilliancy to illuminate the side of the church to enable people to count the chapboards a quarter of a mile away?  
Again, could a fireball of that description travel in the face of a strong wind at that speed? Or might there have been a strong undercurrent under the hills in a contrary direction to that of the main superstratum above?  
I take it for granted, Mr. Editor, that the fact of none of the three appearing to have material substance or to have fallen from above precluded the idea of their being of meteoric origin.

**Ten Good Things to Know.**

1. That salt will curdle new milk, hence in preparing milk porridge, gravies, etc., the salt should not be added until the dish is prepared.
2. That clear boiling water will remove tea stains and many fruit stains. Pour the water through the stain and thus prevent its spreading over the fabric.
3. That ripe tomatoes will remove ink and other stains from white cloth, also from the hands.
4. That a tablespoonful of turpentine boiled with white clothes will aid in the whitening process.
5. That boiled starch is much improved by the addition of a little sperm, salt or gum arabic dissolved.
6. That beeswax and silt will make rusty flat irons as clean and smooth as glass. Tie a lump of wax in a rag, keep it for that purpose. When the irons are hot, rub them first with the wax rag, then scour with paper or cloth sprinkled with silt.
7. That blue ointment and kerosene mixed in equal proportions and applied to the bedsteads is an unfailing bedbug remedy, as a coat of whitewash is for the walls of a log house.
8. That kerosene will soften boots or shoes that have been hardened by water, and render them as pliable as new.
9. That kerosene will make a tin tea kettle as bright as new. Saturate a wooden rag and rub with it. It will also remove stain from varnished furniture.
10. That cool rain water and soda will remove machine grease from washable fabrics.
