ITEMS OF INTEREST IN CONDENSED FORM.

The German Socialists have introduced a bill in the Reichstag demanding a working day of ten hours.

A strike of 8,000 workmen in the Connellville, Pa., coke region is almost certain to begin this week.

O'Donovan Rossa, who was recently convicted of criminal libel on P. S. Cassidy, was fined \$100 on Thursday.

The revenues of Great Britain for the year ended March 31 amounted to £89,304,316, and the expenditure to £86,083,314.

Company "B," of the 13th Battalion, Hamilton, will visit Brantford as the guests of the Dufferin rifles on the Queen's birthday.

The Hamilton Hospital Committee has decided to appoint a lady superintendent to have charge of the nurses and the training school.

A terrible cyclone swept across Hood county, Texas, on Sunday last, killing a number of people and doing great damage to property.

In the Imperial Commons Thursday night, Sir James Ferguson denied that the Government had proposed a convention with the Porte making Great Britain permanent protector of Egypt.

The report of the Panama Canal Commissioners estimates that it would cost 485 million francs to complete the canal on the lock system, and would take seven or eight years' time.

The Longue Pointe asylum, near Montreal was burned to the ground on Tuesday. Over an hundred of the unfortunate inmates are supposed to have perished in the flames.

The Reform Association of Toronto met in convention in Shaftsbury hall Thursday night and nominated ex-Ald. Joseph Tait and Ald. A. McDougall as their candidates at the coming Ontario elections.

At the London Assizes Thursday the celebrated case of Moody v. Bank of Commerce, an action for vexatious arrest, was decided in favour of the Plaintiff, the jury returning a verdict for \$8,500 damages.



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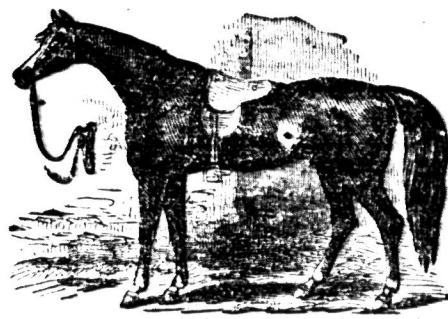
