The International Prison Congress will open in St. Petersburg on June 16.

Two pronounced cases of leprosy are reported in the Chinese colony of Chicago.

Mr. Geo. Munro Grant, second son of Principal Grant, of Kingston, died Wednesday of typhoid fever.

The race for the Kentucky Derby, which was run last week at Louisville, was won by Corrigan's Riley, the favorite, Rodespierre, being third.

A farmer of Ipswich, Mass. while ploughing in his field the other day, found an Indian idol in the shape of a serpent, an undoubted relic of the stone age.

Dr. J. P. Russel one of the old practitioners in Toronto, having been born in 1821, died suddenly at his residence Wednesday morning of apoplexy.

Sir John Macdonald announced in the House Wednesday night that there were no negotiations in progress looking towards the annexation of Newfoundland.

At the second day of the annual session of True Blues, held on Wednesday last in St. Catharines, Mr. R. Newman, of Toronto, was elected Grand Master for the current year.

The Premier announced Wednesday to the members of the Dominion Parliament that there would be no extra sessional allowance on account of the length of the session.

The annual meeting of the shareholders of the Canadian Pacific railway was held in Montreal yesterday. The report shows a surplus of \$2,226,926 on the year's business.

The Winnipeg Free Press says that such arrangements have been made between the Dominion Government and the Hudson Bay railway as will enable the company to at once commence the work of construction.

The Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacific railways announce that in consequence of frauds which have been practised upon them by grain shippers, all grain must pass through the companies' elevators.

Signor Crispi, in his speech in the Italian Chamber of Deputies, said that the policy of the triple alliance was unchanged. In Africa, Italy does not intend to pursue an aggressive course, and will act in accord with England. Speaking of the condition of the workingman, he said that the reports of his privations were greatly exaggerated.
