Ottawa claims a population of 43,122.
The fire in the C. P. R. coal pile at
Fort William is still raging.

Sunday the Prince of Wales entered
upon his half-century year.
A heavy earthquake shock in Guay-
amas, Mex., Sunday morning caused
great fright but little damage.

A maniac named Fumival fatally cut
his wife's throat on Saturday with a
razor at Clarenceville, Quebec.

The president has issued a proclama-
tion designating Thursday, November
27, as a day of thanksgiving in the
United States.

After thorough tests the Italian Gov-
ernment has chosen Armstrong in pre-
ference to Krupp guns for use in its
new batteries.

Upwards of 20,000 bushels of wheat
was marketed at Brandon on Friday
and 15,000 on Saturday. As high as
82 cents was paid.

The Chicago packers of canned meats
have decided to advance canned meats
a pound, to cover the cost of the cans
under the new tariff.

A London despatch says Mr. Steven-
son's father Mr. Birchall, has sent
word to his daughter to return to Eng-
land without delay.

Heavy snowstorms prevailed Sunday
in southern Minnesota and Dakota,
and old settlers and Indians say winter
has set in.

Several cars of an east bound freight
train on the G. T. R. air line left the
rails near Delhi Sunday, and some cattle
sheep and hogs were killed.

At Chicago on Saturday night the
horse Rosebery beat the world's record
for high jumping by one-half inch,
clearing seven feet one and three-quarter
inches.

Bones supposed to be those of Mary
Doyle, a domestic, have been found in
the ruins of the Leland hotel at Syra-
cuse. This makes eight fatalities in
connection with the fire.

The White Star and Inman steamship
companies have decided that there shall
be no more ocean racing between their
steamers. It is expected the other com-
panies will join in the agreement.

The American committee for the re-
lief of famine in Ireland has issued a
circular withdrawing requests for
American money and clothing, as Great
Britain has practically promised to see
that no famine shall exist.

The Welsh delegates sent to the
United States to investigate tin plate
interests have returned home and re-
ported that the Welsh trade will not be
injured, as the tin deposits in the States
are wholly inadequate.

Several leading leather and hide
dealers of the United States met at
Minneapolis on Friday and entered into
an agreement as to the future grading
of leather. It is understood they will
attempt to advance prices in a few
weeks.

James Daxco and George Redpath,
extradited from Toronto for robbing
Robert Smalley, of Orion, Mich., pleaded
guilty and were sentenced to four years
each at Jackson. John Ward, an ac-
complice, gets one year at Ionia.

Woodstock Times:—A lady not far
from the Times office placed her seal
skin muff and a fine winter hat in the
stove to keep them from moths and
carpet bugs. During one of these recent
cool evenings a fire was kindled
in the stove and the muff and hat went
up in smoke.

Col. Price, who was shot by Judge
Higgins on Thursday at Sedalia, Mo.,
has died. Judge Higgins was released
on \$10,000 bonds and has not been re-
arrested. His plea will be self-defence.
During the altercation between him
and Col. Price the colonel slipped the
judge in the face. It was then that
the judge fired the fatal shot.

Canada claims to have produced the
largest cheese in the world. From the
Ingersoll factory was lately turned out
a cheese weighing seven thousand
pounds. It was six feet ten inches in
diameter, three feet in height and
twenty-one in circumference. It re-
quired the milking of seven thousand
cows, or thirty-five tons of milk to
produce it.

A simple looking object, which will
probably have an interesting connection
with the Benwell tragedy, was on board
a G. T. R. car which went through
Hamilton on Friday morning en route
from Don to Woodstock. It was the
large weight which will be used in
connection with the hanging of Birchall.
It weighs 350 pounds, and was consigned
to Sheriff Perry, of Woodstock.

Solicitor, Mr. G. W. Wells, Q.C. who ad-
vised an appeal. The case was argued
before the County Judge, who has
given a judgment relieving the Town
of Simcoe from the heavy liability,
charging the same against the County
