

CURRENT NOTES.

Canadian cheese in the front rank
and received the highest awards at the
annual show of the British Dairy Far-
mers' Association in London recently.

The Imperial Produce Commerce, a
Canadian concern, has intimated to the
Finance Minister that it is now prepared
to ship Canadian farm products to Eng-
lish markets on commission. It was
organized as a result of the McKinley
Bill.

Since the new crop of malt and hops
has come in the prices to the brewers
have been jumped up, so that the cost
for the manufacture of all malt liquors
has been materially increased. On a
barrel of beer the brewers figured that
the increase by the new scale of prices
is about one dollar.—Newark, N. Y.,
Journal.

Guelph Mercury:—Let the Americans
have their own policy and we will have
ours. It matters not how much we
might wish to have commercial union
with the United States; they won't con-
sent to it. The question, then, is, whether
we will dignifiedly and, in a business
like way attend to our own affairs; or,
as the Liberals suggest, go cringing
and whining for favors at Washington.
Will we act like men or like cravens?

Detroit Sun:—Potatoes are scarce and
command a high price in the east. The
crop throughout the United States is
nearly a failure. There are plenty of
them, however, in Canada, but the new
law imposes a tax of 25 cents a bushel if
they are shipped into the States. This
is a glorious bit of information to impart
to the poor men of Michigan, who live
within a stone's throw of Canada, and
are compelled to pay 25 cents on every
bushel they buy.

The Belleville Intelligencer gives an
interesting history of the cheese indus-
try of Canada. It appears that twenty-
five years ago we imported \$490,000
worth of cheese from the United States;
and there was not a factory in the land.
Since then great attention has been
given to cheese making and now we
have numerous factories and we export
to England no less than 88,500,000
pounds annually, or \$9,000,000 worth.
It may be added that the cattle trade
has had a similar history. Ten or twelve
years ago we exported no cattle to
England, but last year we sent away
\$5,000,000 worth.

The proposal of Hon. G. W. Ross, Min-
ister of Education, to raise the minimum
age at which teacher's certificates may
be granted from 19 to 21 years is a good
one, and should do much to increase the
efficiency of the schools. It is true the
law may seem hard in some cases, as
now and then a young man or young
woman is capable of doing good work at
the former age but in the majority of
cases teachers will give better satisfac-
tion if they enter the profession not
earlier than at 21 years of age. Teach-
ers will always make use of this line of

work as a stepping stone to something
else and they cannot be blamed for it—
but the school law should remedy it as
much as possible. A large number of
teachers commence when about 19 and
continue for not more than three
years, when they quit the work forever.
If the minimum age is raised to 21 years
those who commence will by this time
have a better training and will be far
more likely to continue and make teach-
ing their profession through life. It will
also have a tendency to raise the salaries
which in rural sections, at least, have
always been far too low. Much can be
done in the way of good text books, and
in prescribing programmes of study, but
the success of our schools must depend
upon the character of our teachers, and
the measure proposed by Hon. Mr. Ross
should meet with general approbation.—
Delhi Reporter.

Face Reading.
