Manitoulin Island.

To the Editor of the Jarvis Record:

It may be remembered by those who
read your Manitoulin correspondence
that a deer hunt was spoken of in pros-
pective. Said hunt has taken place and
this is what the Manitoulin Expositor,
published in the town of Little Current,
says of the result:

"Messrs. Martin Buck, Benjamin Buck
and his sons-in-law returned this week
from a trip to the Indian Peninsula
whither they had gone for some deer
hunting. The party were out a little
over a week and during that time killed
twelve deer and so many rabbit and
partridge that they had some difficulty
in getting rid of them. They were
most enthusiastic about the sport and
not a little proud of their record. They
failed only in one thing and that was
in not leaving a piece of venison at the
Expositor office."

I am sorry to say that this account
from some means (not mine) is some-
what overdrawn, but we had a grand
old-fashioned hunt without a doubt and
a score of other Walpole and Woodhouse
old hunters could not be present to
enjoy it with us. Our comfortable
camp, seven miles from Tobermory,
was admired by numerous hunting
parties less favored than ourselves. It
was got up in the most primitive and
picturesque style and was withal well
thoroughly proof, with the conveniences of a
table, seats, good sleeping apartment,
with a glowing fire of birch and maple
in the middle. And best of all it was
soon hung around with rabbits, partridge,
porcupines and deer. Of our
party I was the least successful and a
son of mine the most expert and success-
ful.

The deer at this end of the peninsula
were plentiful, driven thither to this
their last lurking place from the main
land. We were too early for good
hunting, however, and could not remain
till the proper time as navigation would
then be closed. Tramping over the dry
falling leaves through the dense brush
a flash of the white flag must be followed
instantly by the crack of the rifle or
your chance was gone. Thus twenty-five
or thirty shots were thrown away,
several deer wounded and only three
ones secured. My son got the best
one and without doubt badly wounded
two more the same day. It would not
be well perhaps for hunters more than
others to have things all their own way.
We were happy to have a good time and
most with no unpleasant accident. My
son and myself left for home a week
before the rest of the party. At Club
Island where we lay a day and night
under stress of weather, the crews of
four fishing tugs kept us company
while looking at the piles of fine salmon
trout they had drawn fresh from the
water. They said to us "Take all you
want of them and give us that deer."
Oh, no, said I, we have as good as that
on the Manitoulin, and on getting home
my answer was verified by the
fine whitetail my boys had taken with
the spear, getting no less than 37 fine
ones the night of our arrival home.
Crops of all kinds except oats are good
in this locality. Fall weather rough
and boisterous. The staunch steamer
Pacific with quite a crowd of our citi-
zens had lately rather a rough and
perilous trip to Collingwood, even the
veteran Capt. Campbell got off his base.

filled with children beautifully attired

p.m. the glorious peals of the orchestra
announced the arrival of the carriages
containing the bridal party and guests.

The bride was sited with the melo-
dious strains of the wedding march and
a shower of natural flowers from the
children in the gallery as she entered
the church leaning on the arm of her
cousin, Rev. W. Pugsley, who conducted
her to the altar. The bride was ex-

bridal costume consisting of a combina-
tion of cream watered silk and satin
with a train. The magnificent bridal
veil reaching to the end of the train
artistically arranged and attached to a
beautiful coronal of pearls and orange
blossoms which gave the bride a strik-

while in her left hand she carried an

bridesmaid while the bridegroom was
supported by Rev. J. E. Ayeart of Dor-
chester Station. The ceremony was
performed by Rev. J. E. Moore assisted
by Rev. W. Pugsley, Rev. R. Thomson

ceremony was over the children strewed
the pathway to the carriages with
flowers and the wedding march began
and continued until the wedding party
re-entered the carriages in waiting.
They proceeded to the G. T. R. station
where four hundred friends and ac-
quaintances had assembled to offer
congratulations and bid fond adieux.
The train soon arrived and mid a grand
parting salutation the newly wedded
pair gaily stepped on followed by
slippers, rice and flowers expressive of
kind wishes for their future prosperity

The Hamilton Presbytery met in St.
Paul's school room, Hamilton, at 9.30
Tuesday morning of last week. There
was a large attendance of ministers and
laymen. Rev. Dr. Fraser, Moderator,
presided.

Rev. Mr. Wells reported that he had
moderated in a call in Cayuga to a min-
ister on Nov. 4, which issued unani-
mously in favor of Rev. Joseph Johnson.
Messrs. M. McClung, John Thompson
and William Parker were heard as dele-
gates in support of the call. On motion
the call was sustained as a regular gos-
pel call, and put into Rev. Mr. Johnson's
hands. He accepted it. His induction

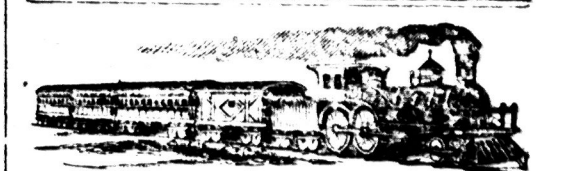
