The Walpole Agricultural Society  
will hold their 38th Annual Exhibition  
in Jarvis on Tuesday and Wednesday  
next, October 7th and 8th. The direc-  
tors are sparing neither time nor money  
in making this exhibition the best ever  
held by the society. The prizes offered  
for stock, agricultural products and  
domestic manufactures are as large as  
those of any other society in the county.  
The entries at this early date are fast  
coming in, many of them from a dis-  
tance, and the prospects are that the  
exhibition this year, should the weather  
prove favorable, will be in advance of  
those of previous years. The capable  
and painstaking directors have such  
confidence in the growing popularity of

### A Lady Farmer 100 Years Old.

PLAINFIELD, N. J. Sept. 22.—The  
oldest woman in the Union county is  
Mrs. Nancy Baker, who has just attained  
the age of a 100 years, and at a  
recent reunion four generations were  
present to do her honor. Mrs. Baker  
was born near Springfield, N. J. She  
has lived near her birthplace for a full  
century, never moving more than 40  
miles from her father's homestead.  
During her life she has been accus-  
tomed to drinking strong tea or coffee at  
every meal. Her face is unmarred by  
a wrinkle, and her eyesight is remark-  
ably good, as she has never used eye-  
glasses. Her voice and her memory  
for dates are remarkable. Her appear-  
ance would not indicate an age above  
70 or 80 years. Mrs. Baker personally

conducts the management of a farm  
near Westfield. It is twelve acres in  
extent, and one of the best paying farms  
in the Union county. During the past  
harvest time Mrs. Baker went to the  
field to watch the men cutting hay.  
One of the laborers did not swing his  
scythe to suit, and, taking the imple-  
ment from him, she showed him how to  
use it in an efficient manner. She  
remembers when central New Jersey  
was one vast wilderness.
