ITEMS OF INTEREST IN CONDENSED FORM.

It is feared that the yacht Annie S. from Detroit, has been lost with all on board on Lake Huron.

A state of siege has been proclaimed in Goa in consequence of the election riots. The excitement is intense.

Both Slavin and McAniff have agreed that the winner in their fight will meet Jackson, the Australian champion.

There is to be a mass meeting in Ottawa to-morrow evening to discuss the Dominion Government's treatment of the Oka Indians.

An explosion occurred Thursday on board the steamer Pandora at Newcastle, Eng., by which twelve persons were so badly injured that they will die.

The National Council of the Irish National League of America, in session in Cincinnati, has passed a resolution denouncing the English "tyrants" for arresting the "patriots," Messrs. Dillon and O'Brien, and endeavoring to murder the people of Ireland in the dark.

The conferees who have the McKinley Tariff bill under consideration have not as yet been able to arrive at a satisfactory agreement. They have cleared away all difficulties except the duty on binding twine and the grading of sugar and these obstacles they appear to be unable to surmount.

The recent decision in the Court of Appeal in Montreal in the case of the Great North Western Telegraph Company against the Montreal Telegraph Company will be appealed by the Great North-Western.

Hon. William Macdougall returned Thursday to Ottawa from Cobourg, where he recently met with a severe accident. His health is improving, though he still suffers from the strain and bears traces of his confinement.

Mr. Sherman's proposed reciprocity clause in regard to Canada was struck out by the Washington conference on the ground that they had decided that they cannot deal with anything except disputed matters between the two Houses.

The difficulty in inducing candidates to stand as Government candidates in Napierville and Port Neuf has delayed the issue of writs in those Counties but they will be issued early next month.

The Society of German wine-growers have sent a memorial to Chancellor Von Caprivi declaring that the McKinley bill will ruin the export trade with America, and asking whether it is possible to obviate this by diplomatic means.

The Anti-Slavery Convention, sitting in Paris, recommends that the work of suppressing slavery be divided among national committees, which shall have a common aim, but which shall act separately, chiefly through missions to moralize the natives.

At the Methodist Conference sitting in Montreal it was decided Friday that the Epworth League, and the Christian Endeavour Societies should amalgamate under the name of the Epworth League, and that the religious department shall be known as the Christian Endeavour.

William McCarter, a laborer on the Kingston dry-docks, has joined the Roman Catholic Church owing to his being cured of fits by his observing, under the direction of a priest, as he states, certain religious ceremonies, consisting of reciting prayers and swallowing a picture of the Virgin Mary.

Three members of the Alpine Club of Paris, France, have returned to Ottawa from a trip to the Rocky Mountains. They succeeded in taking observations from the summit of Mount Sir Donald, at an altitude of 11,000 feet, and ascertained that the mountain is 400 feet higher than set down in the Dominion Government Survey reports.

A rather peculiar and quite laughable accident happened the other night just after a heavy rain commenced, to a family living—well we not give them away. When the rain began the head of the family concluded to save some rainwater and stepped out upon a landing at the back of the building to place a vessel under a spout. A portion of the landing gave way and he fell through to the ground below, a distance of ten or twelve feet. He of course yelled vociferously during his descent and his wife's sister went to investigate. She, too, went through the hole to the ground and did her part of the yelling. The wife then went out to see what the matter was and started through the hole, but being quite a fleshy woman, tipping the beam at 250, struck fast. Then a trio of yells waked the neighborhood. A ladder was procured and the woman was finally rescued, but soaked to the skin. The rescuers say the yells could be heard clear to Jericho. Fortunately no one was hurt.—Reporter.

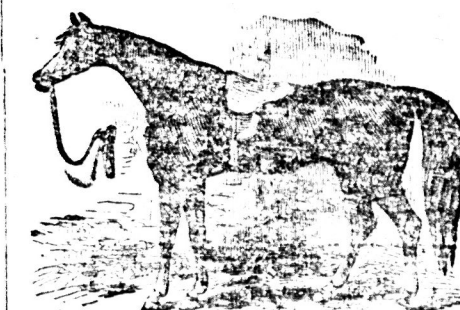
