At the recent meeting of the county

Three years is the longest term a  
 Methodist minister can remain in one  
 church. An attempt has been made to  
 lengthen the pastorate, where mutually  
 satisfactory, to four years, but the  
 General Conference has set down on it  
 by a majority of 131 to 104.

Probably one of the roughest pieces  
 of track in Ontario is that of the N. &

 pointed Superintendent of this division  
 a decided improvement is to be made.  
 It is to be ballasted and a large force of  
 men are now at work on it.

Three officers of the 37th Battalion,  
 we see by the 1st Gazette, have resign-  
 ed their commission. Lieuts. Knox, No.  
 1, York, Halligan, No. 5, Jarvis, and  
 Walker, No. 7, Caledonia. Mr. Walker  
 has been in No. 7, since 1892, Mr. Halli-  
 gan since 1870, Mr. Knox, though a  
 young soldier, will be missed by the  
 York Company, as he is one of the best  
 shots in the battalion.

Various charges have been made  
 against the conduct of his honor Judge  
 Upper, of this county, as to alleged  
 irregularities in the administration of  
 justice in the county, a commission has  
 been issued to Mr. Justice Patterson,  
 of the Supreme Court of Canada, em-  
 powering him to hold an investigation  
 under the Act relating to County Courts.  
 The charges will be put in the hands of  
 counsel to conduct the investigation  
 before Judge Patterson.

STRAY ANIMALS.—When a man ad-  
 vertises that a stray animal is on his  
 premises, it generally happens that half  
 a dozen people turn up to see if it  
 belonged to them. This shows that at  
 this time of the year numbers of animals  
 are astray, but some men will harbor  
 an animal for months before they will  
 do simple justice to the unknown owner
