# WALPOLE'S GREAT FAIR

Not a Large Success on Account

A LARGER NUMBER OF ENTRIES THIS YEAR THAN IN PREVIOUS YEARS-OVER 1600 PEOPLE PRESENT. The 38th annual exhibition of the Walpole Agricultural Society was held in Jarvis on Tuesday and Wednesday of last week. The rain on Monday and Tuesday made the track so muddy that the races could not take place, although there was a number of good horses here. Had the weather kept tine the races would, no doubt have been the best ever held in Jarvis. Wednesday turned out to be fine and warm and over sixteen hundred people visited the Firemen's Band was present and discoursed excellent music during the day. The show of horses was excellent and many fine animals would do credit to any fair, while the judges found it difficult to decide in many classes The exhibit of cattle which consisted of Jerseys, Durhams and grades was not very large. In sheep the exhibit was good and the entries were about equal to those of previous years, among them being some very fine specimens. The exhibit of hogs was not up to that of former years. Gideon Snyder carried off all the prizes on Berkshires while Thos. Watson did the same in Suffolks. The poultry exhibit was very fair, and some handsome birds were among them. Some fine samples of grain and seeds were to be seen and altogether the exhibit was very creditable. The Root and Vegetable department was well represented. In the Horticultural department, notwithstanding the general failure of the apple crop, there was a very good display, and the sample very creditable.
