## WALPOLE'S GREAT FAIR

Not a Large Success on Account  
of Rain.

A LARGER NUMBER OF ENTRIES THIS  
YEAR THAN IN PREVIOUS YEARS—  
OVER 1600 PEOPLE PRESENT.

The 38th annual exhibition of the  
Walpole Agricultural Society was held  
in Jarvis on Tuesday and Wednesday  
of last week. The rain on Monday and  
Tuesday made the track so muddy that  
the races could not take place, although  
there was a number of good horses here.  
Had the weather kept fine the races  
would, no doubt have been the best  
ever held in Jarvis. Wednesday turned  
out to be fine and warm and over  
sixteen hundred people visited the  
grounds in the afternoon. The Jarvis  
Firemen's Band was present and dis-  
coursed excellent music during the  
day. The show of horses was excellent  
and many fine animals would do credit  
to any fair, while the judges found it  
difficult to decide in many classes.  
The exhibit of cattle which consisted of  
Jerseys, Durhams and grades was not  
very large. In sheep the exhibit was  
good and the entries were about equal  
to those of previous years, among them  
being some very fine specimens. The  
exhibit of hogs was not up to that of  
former years. Gideon Snyder carried  
off all the prizes on Berkshires while  
Thos. Watson did the same in Suffolks.  
The poultry exhibit was very fair, and  
some handsome birds were among  
them. Some fine samples of grain and  
seeds were to be seen and altogether  
the exhibit was very creditable. The  
Root and Vegetable department was  
well represented. In the Horticultural  
department, notwithstanding the gen-  
eral failure of the apple crop, there was  
a very good display, and the simple  
very creditable. In Dairy Products  
there was a fair display of bread, cheese,  
butter, sealed fruits, etc. Some very  
fine comb and extracted honey was  
shown in the Apian exhibit. The  
Manitoba exhibit in the drill shed was  
neatly arranged, and made a neat dis-  
play. Information was cheerfully fur-  
nished to farmers and others enquiring  
and literature distributed setting forth  
the advantages of the North-West. The  
Fine Art department made a good dis-  
play, and the various paintings in oil  
and water colors, and pencil drawing  
were pronounced very fine. As usual  
the display of Ladies' Fancy Work was  
large, and much credit is due the ladies  
that exhibited them. J. H. Eckhardt,  
of Selkirk, had a neat exhibit of the  
Raymond sewing machines in the hall.  
The Home Manufacturers display was  
an excellent one, and some nice car-  
riages, wagons, buggies, phaetons and  
certainly were exhibited by Messrs. Steel  
& Sowter, Wm. Chambers, and Ross &  
Livingston of this place. The former  
had a very large display. The exhibit  
of Furniture was the best we have ever  
seen at this fair. good displays were  
made by Messrs. Stephen Lounsbury  
and John Lambert of Jarvis, consisting  
of parlor and bedroom suites, sideboards,  
etc. which received more than passing  
attention. Mr. O. C. Read, of Chea-  
side, had an excellent display of tin and  
copper ware which was neatly arranged.  
Samuel Allen, of Jarvis, made a nice  
exhibit of double and single harness,  
and was a creditable display. An ex-  
hibit was made by A. Rodgers consist-  
ing of fine and coarse boots. J. A.  
Bunn, plowmaker, of this place made  
an exhibit of plows, harrows, pumps,  
cultivators, etc., and reflects much  
credit on his enterprise. About 4 o'clock  
the exhibitors began to load up, and  
the crowd commenced to disperse for  
their various homes regretting that the  
track had not been in good condition  
for the races. Walpole Fair is becoming  
known and we have heard it remarked  
that it is the best fair in the county.  
All we want is fine weather and good  
roads and a good turnout is ensured.
