James Lumsden, master of six languages, died on Wednesday in the Hamilton House of Refuge at the age of 66.

Every person who subscribed for the Episcopal ring presented to Bishop O'Connor at Sandwich on Thursday was a Protestant.

A fire occurred yesterday in the historic Blue Coat school in London, but the flames were subdued before much damage was done.

Brother Eth. Berbers, of Les Petites Eerres de Marie, was Thursday fined \$50 dollars and costs in Montreal for pulling a pupil's ear and causing injury to that delicate organ.

The London Labor World asserts that Mr. Hoare, the British Consul in New York in 1883, sent James McDermott to Montreal for the purpose of getting up a dynamite scare.

A meeting of the National Baseball League was held Thursday in New York, but nothing definite is known as to the reported amalgamation of the League and Brotherhood.

A great deal of interest was created in Montreal business circles Thursday when it became known that the Citizens' Insurance Company had purchased the entire business of the Glasgow and London Insurance Company.

#### Arthur Hoyt Day Will Hang.

EXPIRATION OF HIS CRIME TO BE MADE DECEMBER 18.

WELLAND, Oct. 7.—At the Welland Assizes to-day, with Hon. Justice Ross presiding, Arthur Hoyt Day was placed on trial for the murder of his wife, Deseriah, on the 27th day of July 1st. Mr. E. F. B. Johnston conducted the case for the Crown, and Mr. W. M. German defended the prisoner.

His honor reviewed the evidence in a very impartial manner and the case was given to the jury at 10.15 p.m.

The jury returned at 12.45, after being out 2½ hours, and brought in a verdict of guilty. His Lordship, in giving sentence, said he reserved a case on the admission of certain evidence referred to. Subject to that he held out no hope. The sentence was that Arthur Hoyt Day should be hanged on the 18th of November.

The prisoner remained stolid throughout and when asked had he anything to say why the sentence of death should not be pronounced upon him said, "No, my Lord, except that I am not guilty."

WELLAND, Ont., Oct. 8.—On the opening of court this morning Mr. Johnson, Crown Counsel, pointed out that Day, found guilty of wife murder, has been sentenced to be hung on Thursday, November 18th, and November 18th was on Tuesday. His Lordship stated it was his intention to sentence him to be hung on Tuesday, Dec. 18th and it was changed accordingly.

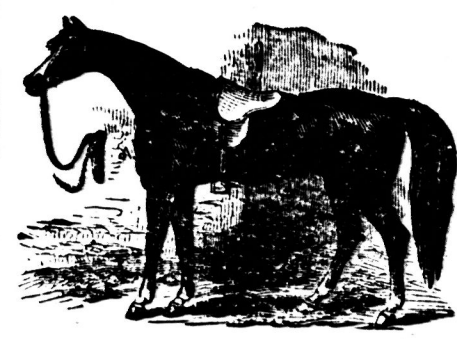
