PORT DOVER, Oct. 12.—This quiet town has been thrown into a state of intense excitement over the mysterious death from poisoning of Mrs. Nettie Trusdale, the 33-year-old wife of John Trusdale, nightwatchman at the knitting mills here. Deceased was only ill five hours and Mrs. Walker and Nairn, who were in attendance, pronounced her death to be due to strychnine. Dr. Walker, county coroner, assisted by Drs. Hayes and Nairn, made a post mortem examination, and finding evident traces of poison, forwarded to Analyst Ellis at Toronto some of the viscera of the deceased for analysis.
