Give the Devil His Due.

Cardinal Smith, who is lying in Sim-
coe Jail awaiting his trial on a charge
of having five years and more ago
murdered a girl, now known as Maria
Colville, has probably as few friends as
any man on earth. Unlike Rex Bur-
chell, he is without a dollar, nor has he
behind him any money or influence.
If he is to get a fair and impartial
trial it will be because the people in
this county who believe in British Fair
Play insist upon it.

Just at present the out-look for such
a trial seems pretty black. We are not
disposed to offer one word in defence of
Smith's record. He is and has been
probably all that his neighbors allege.
It is certain that he has been a persist-
ent law breaker and for his sins has
been from time to time called to account
by the strong hand Justice.

But the people should not forget that
it is not on his past record that Smith
is now to stand his trial. He has been
indicted for murder and unless this
charge is brought home to him he must
walk out of the prison a free man.
Those who by their talk and writing
are attempting to poison the public
mind against the wretch are not doing
what is right.

On the most flimsy evidence, gained
from very questionable sources, nearly
this entire county, from which a jury
to sit upon his case must be chosen, has
seen fit to pronounce him guilty of
Maria Colville's murder and to express
the hope that he may be hanged on
"general principles."

Sensational newspapers have publish-
ed most grossly exaggerated accounts of
the evidence offered at the preliminary
investigation. None of these papers
have had a representative here. The
Toronto Globe of all Canadian journals
alone sent a reporter to look up the case
and his rendering of the story was a
measurably fair statement of the facts.
Other papers, however were not so par-
ticular and without taking thought of
what effect their utterances might have
upon Smith's trial for his life, they
fabricated from imagination a couple of
columns of trash that was wildly over-
drawn.

Gentlemen of the press, men of Nor-
folk, is this fair? If Smith is guilty,
hang him, but for the sake of the good
name of Canada, give him a fair trial.
Do not condemn him in advance.

A Wrinkle in Reckoning Dates.

A gentleman was showing a curious
thing in the State House this noon—
showing how to tell the day of the week
of any date. He gave the following
formula, which can be tried by any one:
Take the last two figures of the year,
add a quarter of this, disregarding the
fraction; and the date of the month, and
to this add the figure in the following
list, one figure standing for each month,
3-6-6-2-4-0-2-5-1-3-6-1. Divide the sum
by 7, and the remainder will give the
number of day in the week, and when
there is no remainder the day will be
on Saturday.

As an example take March 19, 1890.
Take 90, add 22, 19, add 6. This gives
137, which divided by seven leaves a
remainder of four, which is the number
of the day or Wednesday.

WEDDING.—An interesting event
took place on Wednesday last when the
marriage of Mr. John A. Murphy,
county jailer of Cayuga, to Miss Susie
Higgins, of Walpole, was celebrated at
St. Anne's Roman Catholic church east
of this village. The ceremony was
performed by Rev. P. Bardou, of Cay-
uga, assisted by the Rev. P. J. Maddi-
gan, of Dundas. The bride is the
daughter of Mr. Anthony Higgins, a
prominent farmer of Walpole township.
A large number of guests were present
from different parts of the county,
Hamilton, Toronto, Buffalo, New York,
etc. The groomsmen were Dr. T. F.
McMahon, of Toronto, and the brides-
maid was Miss Ella Hyland, of Walpole.
The happy couple left on the evening
train for Toronto, Thousand Islands and
eastern cities.

BOLD ROBBERY.—On Tuesday night
some person, entered the residence of
Mr. Robert Silverthorn, near Round
Plains, by forcing the fastening on the
back door while the family were asleep
and secured a pocket book containing
six \$10 bills and a little less than a
dollar in silver, also a number of receipts
and one or more notes which were all
lying on a table, with a shawl and hat
laid on top of it. It was necessary for
the guilty party to approach as near as
about eight feet to one of the beds, but
this was successfully done without the
household being disturbed and it was
not until yesterday morning when the
family arose and found the back door
opened that they learned some one had
gone through the premises during the
night. The party no doubt knew the
premises well.

SERIOUS FIRE.—Wednesday after-
noon Mr. Enoch Stafford, of Townsend,
who resides about a mile and a quarter
northeast of this place had the misfor-
tune to have his barn totally destroyed
by fire and his house badly damaged,
by a spark from a thrasher engine.
We learn the engine was on the west
side of the barn as also a couple stacks
of grain, and it is thought that a spark
from the firebox of the engine blew
into the stack, as a stiff breeze was
blowing from the west, which set fire
to the premises, and the fire went
through the barn so quickly that the
men at work inside had none too much
time to get out. The barn, grain im-
plements, &c., were swallowed up in
short order, one horse and a democrat
waggon were all that was saved. The
fire spread to the house on the east
side and that too had the roof nearly
burned off the main part and a portion
of the building before the fire was sub-
dued. We learn there was an insur-
ance of \$1,900 which will not near
cover the loss. The separator and a
horse belonging to Mr. Albert Corliss
was also destroyed with the barn and
is another serious loss for him, it being
only a few years ago that Mr. Chapin's
barn was destroyed by lightning and
he lost a separator there and a year ago
his residence near the Round Plains was
destroyed while the family were away
from home, and he lost nearly all his
household goods together with \$177 in
money which he had hid in the cellar
for safe keeping.—Star Waterford.

A Gentleman Cow with 2 Mouths.

A New York City butcher recently
came into possession of a remarkable
animal, being a full-grown bull with
two distinct mouths. The mouth pro-
per of the animal is used solely for eat-
ing, while the other organ is used only
for drinking. The bull is about eight-
teen months old, weighs 1,200 pounds,
and is dappled gray in color, the animal
with the exception of one shoulder and
the forelegs, being well formed. The
regular mouth is of normal size and
contains two full sets of teeth, but no
liquid ever passes between them. The
other mouth, is about five inches in
diameter, at the end of a protuberance
three inches thick, and is situated di-
rectly under the neck, about half way
between the head and shoulders. There
are neither eyes nor ears in connection
with this mouth, but there are nostrils,
through which the animal breathes as
well as through his other nostrils, and a
partial set of teeth, although this mouth
is only used for drinking. The animal
also has double knee and hoof joints.
His disposition is said to be quiet and
gentle.
