Manitoulin Island.

To the Editor of the JARVIS RECORD:
A level plain about two miles square
covered with a dense mass of bushes
about a foot in height, with groups of
human beings, old and young, scattered
here and there was what we saw when
visiting the famous blue berry patch at
Green Bay lately. Hundreds of bushels
had been shipped to Toronto, Hamilton
and other places yet the tempting ber-
ries were still plentiful and looked so
inviting that we could scarcely take
time to greet numerous acquaintances,
so anxious were we to fill our pails, tubs
and baskets. At sundown in place of
camping on the ground as is usually
done, we drove about two miles south
in search of the residence of an old
Walpole man, J. Parkinson, Esq., fami-
liarly known as "Josh." Though our
party representing four different families
consisted of no less than eight individ-
uals, were resolved to sleep in his house,
in his barn, or camp in the road in
front of his place. As we drew near a
comfortable and comfortable looking
house, as we were all strangers in the
locality, we were in doubt whether that
was the place we were seeking, but
were met at the gate with such a wel-
come as convinced us that a Walpole
man with a Woodhouse wife lived there
and had not forgotten old friends. We
found our friend living in the midst of
peace and plenty and had a most enjoy-
able time under his hospitable roof. Our
journey of fifteen miles thither leading
through the Indian Reserve of West
Bay was much enjoyed by the party.
The female portion of which beguiled
the way going and coming with sweet
music.

Red raspberries were very plentiful
this season as was most kinds of wild
fruit excepting the sweet plums which
grow wild and are also cultivated in
gardens.

Some of our readers may say I can
never stop writing about fish. Since
my last letter in company with the Rev.
Wm. Schroeder we had some exciting
work with the robber fish of our lake
the pike, and our table has lately been
supplied with fresh whitefish by head
chief Abram, of the West Bay Indian
Reservation, caught in front of our
place, he and another young Indian
using our boat; the latter remarked to
me "Bime by poity quick you must eat
big heap whitefish." The Manitoulin
Expositor and the Thesalon Advocate
newspapers have been trying lately to
see which could tell the biggest
fish story some of which are rather too
good to be true.

The bear which kept Mrs. Armstrong
a prisoner for some time in a vacant
house of mine, as mentioned in my last
letter, has been seen frequently since
and I hope to be able to give you some
information of a personal interview be-
tween said quadruped and your humble
servant.

The island as usual has been invaded
by summer tourists in large numbers
all of whom seem to delight in our
scenery and fishing, as well as develop-
a good appetite for our bread and but-
ter.

A Boy's Thrilling Adventure.

IN THE EMBRACE OF A MONSTER BLACK
SNAKE—SAVED BY A FAITHFUL DOG.

The nine-year-old son of Henry Ho-
over, of Selkirk, met with a singular
adventure on Wednesday last. Mr.
Hoover has a farm situated about a
mile from the village, where he lives
upon which there is a kind of skinking
or brush pasture, to which the boy was
sent by his parents to bring the cows,
near the close of the day. It happened
that a day or two before, the boy had
been nearly overtaken by a neighbor's
vicious bull that had by some means
got into the enclosure, which pursued
him so closely that he only escaped
injury by a hasty retreat over a high
fence which enclosed some stacks of hay
in an adjoining field. This very nat-
urally frightened the little fellow so
much that he was on the alert for a
second attack on the evening in ques-
tion—and not noticing particularly
where he was stepping, his foot hap-
pened to rest on what he thought was a
dried stick about the thickness of his
arm, but which proved to be a huge
blacksnake about three or four feet
long.

His snakeship, irritated, no doubt,
by the unusual pressure, immediately
coiled itself so tightly about the boy's
legs that he was unable to free himself
from its deadly embrace, and there is
no doubt he would have been killed
outright had it not been for the assist-
ance of a large dog which accompanied
him on this occasion. At the bidding
of the boy, the faithful brute seized the
snake in his teeth, and the little fright-
ened fellow bracing himself in an
opposite direction so as not to be drag-
ged, allowed the dog by a great effort
of strength, to tear the snake loose.
So great was the shock to the little
fellow's nerves that he became tempo-
rarily blind, and would in all probability
not have reached home that night had
it not been for his sagacious canine
friend. Placing his hand on the back
of the dog, he was piloted safely to the
house. He has recovered his sight, but
his mind is terribly shattered, and his
body the subject of frequently recurring
spasmodic fits, the result of his terrible
experience. His recovery is said to be
doubtful. Dr. T. T. S. Harrison is
attending him, and will doubtless do all
that medical skill can accomplish for
his recovery.
