CURRENT NOTES.

The Post-office Savings Bank account
for the month of July shows that the
deposits during the month amounted to
\$631,468, and the withdrawals to \$628,
041. The amount at the credit of
depositors at the close of the month was
\$22,142,025.

The total value of goods entered for
consumption in Canada, exclusive of
British Columbia, during the month of
July was \$9,525,667, of which \$6,555,455
represents the value of dutiable goods,
and \$2,967,212 the value of goods entered
free of duty. The imports include
iron to the value of \$1,148,000; steel,
\$1,619,325; raw sugars, \$600,000, and
silk manufactures, \$341,843. The total
amount of duty collected during the
month was \$2,040,232.

Preparations are being made for the
Methodist General Conference, which
will open in Montreal on the 10th of
September. This will be the second
General Conference since the recent
union, and being the only legislative
body of the church in Canada, its
meeting is looked forward to with con-
siderable interest, especially as the two
important matters of extending the
term of the pastorate and college fed-
eration in Ontario will come up for
decision. The Methodist church in
Canada numbers 227,775 communicants
with 1900 ministers.

When Mr. McKinley's Bill was intro-
duced, remarks the Ottawa Citizen, a
Canadian cheese shipper happened to be
in England, and thinking he saw a
chance for a good thing in eggs, he
made an arrangement with a prominent
produce commission house for direct
shipment of eggs. Oh his return to
Canada he shipped a few cases, and the
result has been so satisfactory, both as
regards price and the condition in which
the eggs arrived, that he is now buying
all the eggs he can get for shipment to
Great Britain, and his example will
doubtless be soon followed by many
others. The beginning is small, but it
is foolish to despise small things. The
first shipment of cattle to Great Britain,
barely fifteen years ago, was only about
a score. The shipments this year will
probably reach 100,000 head. The de-
mand for eggs in Great Britain is
almost unlimited, and as there is no
difficulty in keeping eggs for months
in good condition, there is every reason
to believe that Canada will be able to
find a good paying market in Great
Britain for every egg kept out of the
American market by the McKinley
Bill, and more, too if we had them to sell.
