### NEWS FROM ALL POINTS.

#### A General Epitome of Events of the Week.

#### ITEMS OF INTEREST IN CONDENSED FORM.

About 4,000 union carpenters of Chicago are now out on strike.

The strike of miners in the Mons district of Belgium has ended.

The Porte has authorized the founding of a Russian school in Constantinople.

The Danube has overflowed in Upper Austria and the city of Linz is inundated.

Mrs. Adam Wucheter, of Whitehall, Pa., has, it is asserted, fasted for 154 days.

The Quebec Legislature is to be called for the despatch of business on November 4th.

It is expected that the English dockers will raise close upon £20,000 for the Australian strikers.

It is proposed to tender Count Von Moltke a national ovation on the occasion of his nineteenth birthday.

A medical examination showed the presence of cholera bacilli in the body of a person who recently died in Berlin with symptoms of cholera.

A painful impression has been created in Italian Government circles by the fact that certain officers of an Austrian man-of-war sought an audience with the Pope before officially calling on the Italian Ministry.

The Italian Minister, Crispi, has decided that the presence of the French fleet at Spezia on the occasion of the luncheon of the Italian man-of-war, besides disturbing Italy's foreign policy, would annoy Germany.

The Montreal Gazette, that has heretofore opposed the idea of reciprocity between the United States and Canada, yesterday had an editorial warmly endorsing Senator Sherman's amendment to the McKinley Tariff bill.

The citizens of Gautemula are greatly excited over the shooting of Gen. Barrundia, and there are threats of avenging his death by killing United States Minister Mizner. Mr. Mizner has been urged to leave the city and save his life.

At a conference of the officers of the Players' League and American Association, held in Philadelphia on Tuesday night, an arrangement is reported to have been made for the consolidation of these two important baseball organizations.

The annual meeting of the Dominion Rifle Association was continued at the Rideau ranges, Ottawa, Wednesday, when the 4th Battalion (Frontenac) team won the first prize in the Dominion of Canada match, and the team from the 63rd (Halifax) Battalion carried off the second prize.

A syndicate, composed of sixteen farmers of Downe, agreed during the hot weather to slaughter a beef between 2 and 3 years old. Each Monday for sixteen weeks a beef was killed, divided into 48 pieces, and the members of the syndicate allotted by number three cuts—steak, roast and boil—in such a manner that at the end of the sixteen weeks each member would have received a complete carcass, the person killing keeping the hide. This would give about 25 to 30 pounds of fresh meat per week to each member of the co-operative company.

The by-law to grant \$35,000 to the Tilsonburg, Lake Erie, and Pacific railway was voted on Wednesday in Bayham township, County Elgin, and carried.

At a meeting of employers, held in Sydney, N. S. W. it was resolved that the time had come for employers and capitalists to form a protective association to resist trade strikes.

The body of A. G. Brown, of St. Catharines, who was drowned off the steamer Lakeside while returning home from Toronto, was found on the lake shore near Jordan Thursday.
