The small stump on which young Benwell's foot was resting when his remains were found has been removed to Woodstock and is now on exhibition in the window of Willis' cigar store. The large stump which also supported a portion of the unfortunate young man's body has been nearly all carried away by relic-seekers. Indeed, from one cause and another, the scene has become so completely changed as to be almost beyond recognition.

**HORSE DROWNED.**—A week ago last Friday night a valuable heavy horse belonging to Mr. E. R. Matthews, of Simcoe, was drowned in Lake Erie at Port Dover. The horse was hitched to a democrat and was in charge of Mr. Kilgour, of the Bank of Commerce, who in turning the vehicle around in the street near the Dominion hotel, got into the ditch and was pitched out, the horse running away dashed down street and ran on to the wharf, when it went over into the water with the democrat attached, and was drowned before it could be got out.

A Woodstock despatch says: Col. Benwell, father of F. C. Benwell, the murdered young man, was to have sailed today from England to give evidence at the trial, but he did not. Arrangements were made to meet him in New York. During the progress of the case he was to be the guest of County Attorney Ball, but a cablegram announces the fact that the broken hearted father is dying, and of course will not be a witness against Burchill Col. Benwell's cousin may come to Canada, but this is not certain. From latest reports it is hardly likely that Col. Benwell will survive to hear the verdict.

The Streetsville Review believes in patronizing home enterprises every time. In last issue it told the people not to buy from the fluctuating agent, who is here to-day and away to-morrow, but rather support the agent who is your neighbor, who spends his money in your midst, pays taxes to run the public affairs of your community. This is what should be practiced in every place. How can a corporation prosper that sends its money to some other place for their supplies? The result is sure to prove disastrous. The city junk shop printing office agent is now making his rounds and howling "low prices and good work," and the Review says "Don't believe him." The most local printing offices can do better work for you in every respect. It is also very unpatriotic for people to listen to these junk shop warblers and we trust that none of our citizens will allow him to get the inside track and palm off on them what he can't on his city customers.—Oakville Star.
