The Canadian Pacific railway train from Toronto, with the Toronto representatives on the Esplanade question on board, came into collision with a freight train near Peterborough, Thursday morning. The train was delayed for four hours, but no one was seriously injured.

The New York State Capital at Albany has already cost \$17,000,000. It is not finished, and is in such a ruinous state that immense sums are being constantly spent upon it for repairs. It tumbles down, we are told, as rapidly as it is built up. It is a striking monument to jobbery in public works.

Canada consumes nearly twenty-seven million bushels of wheat and about two million bushels are required for seed. Last year we only produced 27,000,000 bushels; so it was necessary to import into this agricultural country 1,500,000 bushels. This year the conditions are more favorable. It is estimated that we have grown 40,000,000 bushels, and that as a consequence we shall have 10,325,000 bushels to export.

#### How Marshall was Killed.

The identity of the young man who was knocked from a freight car and killed at the Beach street bridge over the New York Central and Hudson River railroad company's tracks on Wednesday last was established yesterday. His name was Thomas Marshall, the son of Thomas Marshall, merchant tailor of Hamilton, Ont. His father and a brother arrived in the city yesterday afternoon and called on Undertaker Mullin, who interred the body in Woodlawn cemetery. Mr. Mullin showed them the dead man's clothing, which was identified as that which the son and brother wore when he left home some weeks ago. To make the identification positive they had the grave in Woodlawn opened and viewed the body. Though the remains were badly decomposed, they were able to state positively that they were those of the missing boy.

The father explained his delay in responding to the telegrams and letters which Mr. Mullin had sent him after finding in the dead man's pockets a bill of Marshall & Son against one David Brown for a balance of \$14 dollars due on a suit of clothes with the statement that he at first supposed that the dead man was Brown. However, in a day or two Brown appeared in Hamilton and then they carefully re-read the description of the dead man given in clippings of the Syracuse papers, which Mr. Mullin had sent on. The son had left home some weeks before and they made up their minds that he must be the man killed here. The young man, it seems, was of a roving disposition, and his people were unable to induce him to settle down in Hamilton. The body will be allowed to remain in Woodlawn until spring, when it will be removed to Hamilton.—Syracuse Standard.
