Secretary. Hon. E. H. Bronson, Minis-
ter without portfolio.

The Blenheim News announces that
Mr. Joseph Dickerson, Chief engineer
of the Lake Erie and Detroit River
Railway, is at work staking out the
eastern extension of the road on which
grading will be commenced at once.

It is said to be the intention to submit
bonus by-laws immediately to all munici-
palities between Blenheim and Sim-
coe. This is the line for which a charter
has been granted to run south of

William Lanark, a wealthy old far-
mer of Lanark County, died fourteen
years ago, leaving \$34,000, the distri-
bution of which was made the occasion
of a law suit by some of the surviving
members of his family. Among the
male heirs was Stephen Holiday, a
married son, who in 1864 left his wife
and two children and went sailing on
the lakes in the schooner Ada Drake,
which was lost in a heavy storm off
Cleveland, and Holiday's family sup-
posed he went down with the vessel.
His widow subsequently married a
Toronto man named Derusha, and
secured an order for the payment of
Stephen's share of his father's money
to her two sons. This was followed by
an order that the money should remain
in the court. Four years ago Mrs.
Derusha, Stephen's wife, died, and lately
Stephen returned to Canada, and told of
his miraculous escape from the wreck
after being washed about the lake for
hours lashed to a spar, and of being
picked up by a propeller, after which he
went to Honduras and Central Amer-
ica. He has been identified by his only
surviving son and a neighbor who
knew him years ago, and yesterday Mr.
Justice Armour made an order for the
payment to him of his share of his father's
estate.
