The union carpenters at work on the new exposition buildings in Spokane Falls, Washington, struck Thursday because the directors found it necessary to purchase a small quantity of lumber from a boycotted mill. Public indignation was at once aroused, and a large number of prominent citizens took off their coats and went to work.

#### Wanted to Die.

John Adlid, a young man 26 years of age a farm laborer, made a most determined attempt to shuffle off this mortal coil early Saturday morning, selecting the most uncivilized and shocking of all methods chosen by the would-be suicides to end their career—that of cutting the throat with a razor. Adlid was employed for some time as a farm hand by Mr. Russ, farmer, South Yarmouth, near Sparta. He appears to have fallen desperately in love with a young widow, and it is believed that because his affection was not returned he grew despondent, and committed the rash act. About a week or ten days ago he left Mr. Russ for his mother's, Mrs. Springstein, who lives in North Yarmouth, about three and a half miles from St. Thomas. For four or five days before the occurrence he had been gloomy and despondent, and moped around and would not eat. On Friday night he went down to South Yarmouth to see his inamorata, and returned home about 12 o'clock. His love affairs had, presumably, not gone on any more favorably, for on his return he was more despondent than usual. He went out, and not returning for about an hour his friends began to fear that something was wrong, and a search revealed him in an out-house, with his throat cut from ear to ear, the blood flowing profusely from the wound. A physician was summoned, and the gaping wound, which was a deep one, was sewed up, requiring a large number of stitches. The cords of the neck and some of the smaller arteries were severed, but the razor by chance, did not cut any of the main arteries, or else the man would have bled to death before medical assistance could arrive. As it was he bled profusely. He is very weak, and the chances for his recovery or death are about even. The man himself has no desire to live, and he thinks it would have been better had he succeeded in his effort to take his life.—Journal.

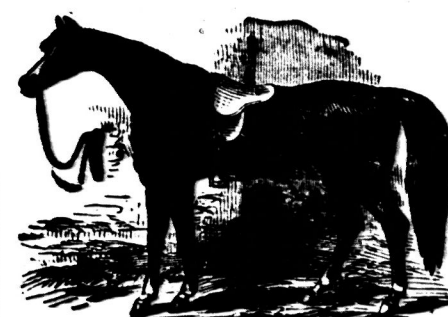
