EXCITEMENT REVIVED IN SIMCOE OVER
THE SAD DROWNING CALAMITY.

SIMCOE, Aug. 1.—Yesterday a boy
named Wesley Brown picked up a bottle
on the lake shore about two miles from
Nanticoke, in which was the following
note written on the back of a business
dodger printed by an Ingersoll pork
dealer:

LONG POINT.—We are tied fast to the
Mabel, 'raid she will sink with us, so good-
bye. W. RYERSON, C. BUNKER.

The find has caused considerable
excitement here, but it is believed by
those who are most reliable to be a fraud
perpetrated by some heartless person
either to keep up the excitement or in
the hope of securing a part of the re-
wards offered for the recovery of the
bodies of Major Ryerson and Mr. Bunker.

The writing is not Major Ryerson's, the
signature is not his, and Mr. Bunker,
whose name was Abel E. Bunker, would
hardly sign C. Bunker if the note was
genuine and had been written by him.
Harry Woodward, sr., the keeper of
the lighthouse on the east end of Long
Point, was here yesterday and he re-
peated his former statement, when
interviewed, that the Mabel foundered
—went out of sight instantly—as he
was watching her. Had she capsized
and floated she would have been picked
up long ago. The boat which drifted
on the beach at Sherston on the 17th
ult. was identified as belonging to the
Mabel by Mr. Matthews, customs col-
lector here, who went down to Sherston
to investigate on the 29th ult., and
brought back with him certain parts of
the boat with the yacht's mark on them.
The chest also found two miles from
the Buffalo breakwater was marked
with the name, yacht Mabel, so that Mr.
Woodward's statement is amply cor-
roborated, and there is but one opinion
now, and that is that the Mabel remains
where she sank, and the bodies are in
all probability lashed to her. The only
way to recover either is by dragging
in 60 feet of water, with the difficulty

of not knowing the exact spot at which
the yacht disappeared.

Drowned at Lynn Valley.

SIMCOE, Aug. 3.—A sad drowning
accident, by which a young man named
Anson Wheeler lost his life, occurred
about 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon at
Lynn Valley, three miles from Simcoe.
He and another young man were re-
turning from Sunday school. When
passing the mill pond there were some
boys in bathing, and Wheeler proposed
to his companion to go in with them.
Wheeler, who could not swim, waded
into the water, got beyond his depth
and began struggling. His companion
being unable to swim, called to two
small boys on the opposite bank, who at
once came to the rescue, and were
twice drawn under by Wheeler in his
efforts to save himself. The young
man then ran and gave the alarm, but
it was nearly an hour before the body
was found, and all efforts at resuscita-
tion were unavailing. Young Wheeler was
about 20 years of age, secretary of the
Sunday school and highly respected by
all who knew him. His death has cast
a gloom over the community.



A NEW KIND OF POTATO WORM.—
The Nanpew Express states that a new
kind of potato worm attacked the potato
vines of various farmers in that section.
It is of a cream and white color and
about an inch to an inch and quarter
in length. The worm penetrates the
vine near the top and works its way
down to the tubers. The top vine thus
deprived of its vitality, wilts and the
result is that all growth is stopped.
Very little damage has been done so far
and it is to be hoped that a speedy pre-
ventative against the ravages of this
worm will be discovered before the
nuisance becomes general as it will
likely be a more difficult job to subdue
than the potato bug.


