The Chilian insurgents have removed their seat of government from Iquique to Copiapo.

The Democratic state convention of Maryland has nominated Frank Brown for governor.

A severe storm visited Gravenhurst Wednesday, and lightning demolished chimneys, tore off shingles, etc.
