When Will They Learn?

GRAND VALLEY, Ont., Nov. 26.—The
other day Martin Hawes, of Marysville,
had to pay \$187.50, and all he has to
show for this large sum is five or six
worthless-old sulky harrows, which no-
body will buy. Last spring a polished
agent called upon him, said that he had
six harrows at Orton station worth
\$37.50 each, and offered to give Hawes
one of them if he would take the lot
from the station to his barnyard. The
agent said that he wanted to have a
central point from which to distribute
the harrows among the farmers around.
The trouble was that Hawes signed a
paper which he thought embodied the
agreement or was only a recommenda-
tion of the harrows. A few weeks

of harrows for \$187.50. A long story is

Hawes had to pay the \$187.50 last week.
The harrows are still lying in his yard,

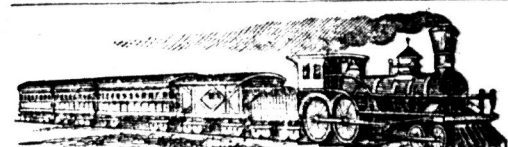
