A Terrible Death.

AN UNKNOWN MAN CUT TO PIECES IN
THE AIR LINE YARDS.

An unknown man was run over
and instantly killed in the west end of
the Air Line yards here on Friday
evening last. It is supposed he was
walking on the track and a strong
western wind which was blowing at
the time, no doubt prevented him from
hearing the approach of the 8.30 train
which was just going out. The loco-
motive and the whole train passed over
him. The body was almost severed at
the waist, and his face and neck were
badly cut. The remains were picked
up and taken to the express office at
the station where they were kept until
Saturday. A large number of our
citizens viewed the remains but no
one could identify him. It is evident
that he did not belong to this section.

The following is a description of the
man as near as we can obtain: Blue
eyes, sandy moustache, dark hair, closely
cropped; height, about 5 feet 8 inches;
age, 35 or 40. He had evidently been
very well dressed. He wore good grey
underwear, grey flannel shirt, a Christie
stiff hat, dark tweed coat and vest, dark
grey overcoat, dark corded striped
pant, wine colored hose, with initials
"A. B. W." worked in them with silk
thread; good laced shoes, with a small
patch on the sole of one of the toe which
had recently been put on. There were
no papers in his pockets by which he
could be identified. In the pockets
were found a clay pipe, some plug
smoking tobacco, 25 cents in silver, a
leaf from a G.T.R. employee's time card,
and a piece of paper upon which was
written "Stewart, Talbot St." and in
another place "John Squance, near the
Thomas and a message was immediately
sent to him by Mr. Morrison, agent at
this station, to which he received a reply
that a man answering the description
given had been there two days before
looking for work, representing himself
as a cabinetmaker. Coroner Howell
did not consider an inquest necessary,
and the mangled remains were buried
by the local authorities in the Methodist
Church Cemetery on Saturday after-
noon.

Henry Ritz, a Mitchell shoemaker,
was found dead Saturday morning in a
ploughed field, having perished from
cold and exposure.

A man giving his name as A. B.
Wallace attempted suicide near Shake-
speare by cutting his throat. He is
now in Stratford Hospital.

Mr. Sylvester Neelon has been nomi-
nated by the Conservatives of Lincoln
for the approaching bye-election for the
House of Commons.

James J. Muldoon, the Toronto man
who is charged with smuggling China-
men from Canada into the United States,
is ill in jail at Auburn, N.Y.

The Ontario Fruit Growers' Associa-
tion will meet at Hamilton on the 15th
inst. A programme of more than usual
interest to fruit growers has been
provided.

Robert Blackley, a bachelor farmer
in comfortable circumstances, suicided
with Paris green in Guelph on Satur-
day. No cause assigned except that he
had been on a spree.
