Mr. Geo. M. Winn, formerly proprietor of the Avimer Sun, which he succeeded in raising to the front rank of county journals, has purchased the Amherstburg Leader, and leaves on Thursday for his new home.

William O'Connor, champion oarsman, made a new record for himself Sunday by walking from Hamilton to Toronto, a distance of 44 miles, in 9 hours and 26 minutes. Ten hours and 30 minutes was the best previous time for the distance.

The latest innovation is to drop the "m" in writing or printing the hour of the day. "10.15 a.m." "2.30 p.m." is the new style. Printers have occasionally, in tabular work, been obliged to adopt this abbreviation—it is now proposed to use it systematically. The suggestion is a good one.

A new time table of the Grand Trunk Railway came into effect on Monday. There is no change in the time of trains on the Loop Line. A couple of slight changes have been made on the N. & N. W. division. The train from Hamilton in the morning now arrives at 8.40 instead of 8.55, and the train going north now leaves at 10 a.m., instead of 10.15.

An oyster supper, under the auspices of Cheapside Council No. 8, C.O.C.F., will be held in Drinkwater's Hall, Cheapside, on Wednesday ev'g, Dec. 10th. Mr. Winn, of Aylmer, chairman of the finance committee, will deliver an address on the benefits of the Order. Suitable music will be provided. Doors open at 6.30; admission 25c. See posters.

The latest wrinkle to draw custom is for a baker to place a two dollar and a half gold piece in a loaf of bread each month to secure the bread trade of a town. Some of the large baking establishments of St. Louis are adopting this method of advertising and are making a success of the scheme.

The committee appointed by the County Council consisting of Reeves Lalor, of Dunnville, Walker, of Caledonia, and Hoover, of Rainham, to investigate the enumerator's list taken last spring, met here in Mr. Miller's office on Monday and continued until Tuesday afternoon. A number of names were struck off. The decision is reserved until the meeting of the County Council on the 17th inst.

The wife of Mr. Joseph Jacques, of Walpole, passed peacefully away on Thursday morning last, in the 57th year of her age, after a lingering illness. The funeral took place on Saturday afternoon from her husband's residence followed by a large number of friends and relatives, and the remains interred in the Methodist Church Cemetery in this village.

The Christmas tree entertainment in connection with St. Paul's Church Sunday School will be held in the Music Hall on Monday evening next. The Rev. D. J. Caswell, of Brantford, will give his celebrated magic lantern exhibition which is a series of beautiful pictures from scripture scenes with an address entitled "Bible Heroes," which will be found very interesting and instructive. Every one is cordially invited. Admission 25 cents, Sunday School children free.
