A new loan of 45,000,000 florins will be issued by the Government of Holland in January.

Up to the present \$4,000 has been subscribed in Kingston for the Macdonald memorial.

The gross value of the late Mr. Parnell's property is sworn at £11,174 and the net value at £6,252.

The Provincial Exhibition will be held in Kingston next year if the Ontario Government will give a grant.

The new commercial treaties between Austria-Hungary and Germany and Austria-Hungary and Switzerland were signed Thursday.

Mr. Trow will again contest South Perth for the Commons, having accepted the candidature tendered by his party Thursday in St. Mary's.

Mahlon McConnell accidentally shot James Pressey while the two young men were quail hunting near Vienna, Ont., Friday.

The death is announced at Buffalo of Capt. Carlisle, of the steamer Milwaukee, who has sailed the lakes for over 30 years.

The Permanent Building and Investment Society, of Melbourne, Australia, has been defrauded of \$56,000 by one of its officers.

Clodius B. Lassell, the Yankee swindler, who shopped many Toronto people two years ago, has been held for trial at Brooklyn, N.Y., for forgery and fraud. He has a bad record, and it is said several wives living in different parts of the States.

The New York Central and Canadian Pacific railroads have contracted to haul 5,000 carloads of western grain over the Canadian Pacific, Rome, Watertown and Ogdensburg, and New York Central to New York for European markets within the next few weeks.

A London despatch says Lord Dufferin has been appointed British ambassador to France.

The town of Pembroke Friday rejected a by-law to put in water works by a majority of 18. Nearly the total available vote was polled and great interest was manifested.

The governor of Rio Janeiro has declined to resign on demand of the Brazilian Government, and the province has been placed under martial law. Much uneasiness is felt.

There is an increase of 40,000 bales in the hop crop of the United States this year, as compared with that of 1890. Prices average 16½c. per pound this year, against 30c. last year.

U.S. Attorney-General Miller proposes to institute a suit against one of the New England railroads to test the right of the company under the later state law to issue free passes.

Bartram, the man supposed to be connected with the Heslop murder in Ancaster, was sentenced Friday in Brantford to 28 months in the Central prison for cattle stealing.

Rev. Charles McCulloch, pastor of Plymouth Congregational church and one of the greatest philanthropists and charity workers in the west, died Thursday at Indianapolis aged 48. He was a long time president of the National Association of Charities and Correction.

At the Reform convention in Almonte Thursday Mr. D. G. Macdonald declined the nomination, and R. J. Dowdall, barrister, Almonte, was chosen instead to contest North Lanark for the Commons. The seat is vacant by the appointment of Mr. Jamieson to a judgeship.

Photos Sent by Wire.

The transmission of pictures by electricity is one of the latest applications of the subtle but extremely useful fluid, and the principle of this new discovery is somewhat similar to that on which the telephone is based, use being made of varying degrees of light, instead of sound, as in the telephone. In order to send a picture over a wire it is first photographed on what photographers call a stripping film, composed of gelatine and bichromate of potash. After the picture is transferred to this film the film is washed with lukewarm water, by which all but the lines of the picture are removed, leaving the photograph in relief.

The point of a tracing apparatus when drawn across this film from side to side rises and falls as it strikes each line of the picture. This wave-line motion of the tracer is made use of to produce similar motion in another tracing apparatus at the other end of the line by means of complicated electrical mechanism, and each depression and elevation in the picture is reproduced in a waxen cylinder on the receiving instrument. To accomplish this it is necessary to go entirely over the picture that is being transmitted, tracing lines across the surface. A single line conveys no idea of the picture, but as they follow each other they gradually outline the object.
