Haldimand Protest.

THE PETITION AGAINST DR. MONTAGUE
DISMISSED—CONSIDERABLE PERSONA-
TION, BUT NOT INDUCED BY AGENTS.

The petition against the return of
Dr. Montague as member of the House
of Commons for Haldimand came on for
hearing on Tuesday morning before
Mr. Justice Rose and Mr. Justice Mc-
Mahon. C. W. Colter and A. K. Good-
man appeared for the petitioner, and
G. T. Blackstock for the respondent.
The case opened the court in stentorian
tones, giving evidence that he is very
familiar with the form of opening an
election petition.

Colin G. Snider, president of the Con-
servative Association, gave evidence
relating to the nomination of Dr.
Montague.

Charges 1, 2 and 3 were taken up.
Charge 1 is that R. W. Mutchmore,
Augustus Almas and Henry Ince con-
spired and procured several persons
named to personate voters at No. 15,
in the Indian reserve. Charges 2 and
3 are that the polls were opened and
closed at a much earlier hour than the
proper time in the furtherance of the
conspiracy and personation.

Hugh Stewart said he was scrutineer
for Colter at No. 15, Indian reserve.
He came to the polls shortly after 8
o'clock and found voting going on; in
fact twelve votes had been put in. H.
J. Ince was the deputy returning officer,
and witness called his attention to the
early hour.

Almas, scrutineer for Montague,
Moses, the poll clerk, and Alex. Hill,
inside guard were the only ones present
when the witness came in. The deputy
returning officer said he was running
the poll by his own time. The clock
was put forward an hour between 9
and 10 o'clock. Witness compared his
time with the other watches and found
very little difference. The polls were
closed a few minutes after 4 by witness'.

Henry J. Ince is a Conservative
and an active man. In cross exami-
nation witness said Ince had showed him
his watch and by his time the polls
were opened all right. He did not see
the clock changed.

John McGraw stated that he was G.
T. R. agent at Hagersville. Stewart
and McGraw came in on election day
and asked for the Grand Trunk time.
Witness telegraphed to Hamilton and
obtained it.

Solomon Garlow went to No. 15 to
vote but heard that Jim Johnston had
been arrested and taken to gaol so did
not vote, as he thought he might be
served the same way.

Solomon Garlow, Jr., John Curdy and
Chas. Silversmith were Indian voters
and did not vote.

Nelson Moses was the poll clerk on
the Indian reserve, and said he did not
see the men as they came to vote, his
back being to the door. He managed to
get his vote in at another polling
place before the polls closed at that
place.

Alexander Hill, the constable, corro-
borated Moses. He knew very little
about it, and did not recognize the
voters.

John Beaver said somebody asked the
deputy returning officer to open the
polls, and the reply was that he would
not till 9 o'clock. This was about 8.45.

Several Indians were then called who
said they did not vote.

Donald McGregor, scrutineer for Col-
ter at the Indian reserve, arrived there
at 8.30 a.m. and found voting going on.
Several other witnesses were called,
but their evidence was not of much
importance.

The judges dismissed the charge
without calling on the respondent,
stating that although there had un-
doubtedly been personation there was
no such inducing or procuring on the
part of an agent as under the statute
would make it a corrupt practice.

Charges seven and eight were taken
up and dismissed.

During the adjournment for supper
the counsel had a consultation, the
upshot of which was that the petitioner
offered no further evidence and the
petition and cross petition were dis-
missed without costs.—Advocate.

To the Editor of the Record:

As a great deal of interest is being
felt in the welfare of our Public and
High Schools it may be well to draw
attention to a few facts in connection
therewith for the information of those
who desire their success. In regard to
the public school no one can dispute the
fact that in every one of its depart-
ments the best of work has been done.
Results of examinations during the past
two years especially showing a very
high degree of efficiency. That good
work has been done cannot be disputed.
Anyone taking the trouble to visit the
school will find that the pupils are thor-
oughly trained in all subjects. Cer-
tainly no grumbling especially by those
who have children attending the school
can exist. Some of those who are not
thus interested may grumble; they do
so without reason. If comparison be
made with any other school in the pro-
vince, our teachers are underpaid rather
than the reverse. There isn't one of
our teachers but that might get a better
salary elsewhere, at any rate could
easily do as well. As far as the general
expenses of the school are concerned
the trustees have been most economical
and they are ready to give a good ac-
count of their trust at the school meet-
ing. The experiment of running a
High School class has been proved a
decided success. It has been an ad-
vantage to the other departments of
the school as well as to the village. Its
maintenance has put no burden on
anyone, the pupils paying the teacher.
In conclusion we would ask all rate-
payers and others interested in the
welfare of the pupils of Jarvis schools
to turn out Wednesday and express
themselves on our school question.
