June 15th, 1891.

The Council met pursuant to adjourn-  
ment, the members all present.

The minutes of last meeting were  
read and approved.

Stadler be authorized to repair the  
underdrain between the Grand Trunk  
Railway and the City Hotel in Jarvis.

damages to wagon and harness sustained  
by breaking through bridge on 4th  
concession. —Carried.

Moved by Mr. Smith, seconded by Mr.  
Stonehouse, and resolved, That George  
Winkworth be paid the sum of \$10.00  
being two-third value of five sheep  
worried by dogs. —Carried.

Moved by Mr. Winger, seconded by  
Mr. Smith, and resolved, That this  
Council do now adjourn and form itself  
into a Court of Revision with the Reeve  
in the chair. —Carried.

On the Council resuming business it  
was moved by Mr. Smith, seconded by  
Mr. Clark, and resolved, That the Clerk  
be instructed to take the necessary  
steps toward stopping up the Lake Shore  
Road opposite Lot 6 in the first conces-  
sion. —Carried.

Moved by Mr. Winger, seconded by  
Mr. Stonehouse, and resolved, That this  
Council grant the sum of \$10.00 to be  
expended in cleaning out the creek in  
the 10th Concession where it crosses the  
3rd side road, and that Mr. Clark be

### Farewell Sermon.

Rev. S. W. Fallis preached his fare-  
well sermon to a large and appreciative  
congregation in Niagara street church  
on Sunday evening. His discourse was  
based upon the text, "Thou God Seest  
Me," Gen. 16, xiii. He dwelt upon the  
watchful Father in contrast to the mis-  
conception of God, a slave driver. He  
strongly denounced the practice of men  
in position instilling fear into their  
pepandants. God's plan was to warn,  
not to drive. This fear was held in  
contrast to the simple trust of a child.  
There was a difference between child-  
ishness and childlikeness. The words  
of the text should warn us of evil, com-  
fort us in trial, and stimulate us to  
labor, then:

"When all life's lessons have been learned,  
And sun and stars for evermore have set.  
The things which our weak judgment here  
has spurned—  
The things o'er which we grieved with  
lashes wet—  
Will flash before us out of life's dark night,  
As stars shine most in deeper tints of blue;  
And we shall see how all God's plans were  
right  
And how what seemed reproof was love  
most true."

And the reverend gentleman dwelt  
upon the fatherly kindness of God, his  
usual logical style broke into an out-  
burst of eloquence that sparkled with  
gems of finest oratory, and fell with  
sweetest cadence upon his spell-bound  
congregation.

Mr. Fallis has made many friends  
while in the city, while his relation to  
his pastorate has been a singularly  
happy one. —St. Catharines Star.

### CHEAPEST IN THE WORLD.

"The people of Canada are getting cheaper  
sugars than any country in the world,"  
remarked a leading wholesale grocer in  
Toronto. "Look here," he continued,  
as he led the way to where a number  
of barrels were standing. "How's that  
for a sample of yellows for 34 cents per  
lb.," he remarked as he drew forth a  
handful and ran his index across it.  
"Isn't it fine? Then we are selling as  
fine a granulated as could possibly be  
produced at 4 1/2c. per lb."

"But how do you make out that  
sugars are cheaper here than in any  
other place in the world? Aren't they  
lower in New York?"

"No, not when you take quality into  
consideration. The sugars turned out  
over there cannot begin to compare  
with those made in Canada, particularly  
granulated."

BRANTFORD, June 23.—The B. W. &  
L. E. railway had its first accident last  
evening, as the evening train was com-  
ing in from Waterford. About two  
miles out the train ran into a tree that  
had been blown across the track by a  
severe windstorm, and the engine was  
derailed and badly broken up. The  
force of the collision completely reversed  
the engine and the driving rod broke  
through the cab, yet almost miracu-  
lously the engineer and fireman escaped  
without serious injury, except that the  
latter had a bad cut on the forehead.  
There were several passengers, but  
none were injured. The railway com-  
pany engaged another locomotive from  
the M. C. R. and trains are running as  
usual.
