Lot 20, Con. 6; Johnston Campbell, to  
reduce assessment, reduced \$200; John  
W. Slack, to reduce assessment, dismis-  
sed; Wm. R. Dennis, to reduce assess-  
ment, dismissed.

W. H. Brown, livery stable keeper, of  
James street north, skipped out on  
Tuesday, leaving a numerous array of  
creditors to mourn his departure.  
Brown has lived a very fast life, and it  
is said that he has involved two young  
girls in ruin. He leaves his wife un-  
provided for, but her father, a neighbor-  
ing farmer, has come into the city to  
take charge of her. Some months ago  
he was in partnership with John Cald-  
well in the livery business on Hunter  
street, and it is alleged, tried to sell out  
and skip in Caldwell's absence; but  
Caldwell got wind of his intentions and  
returned in time to check them. The  
livery stable is now in the possession  
of a bailiff.—Spectator.

The Hamilton police have received  
information from W. F. Kay, of Otter-  
ville, of a burglary out there, which  
occurred ten days ago. Mr. Kay's house  
was broken into, and a quantity of silk  
handkerchiefs, shirts, shoes and hats  
stolen; also \$10 in silver, and between  
two and three hundred valuable silver  
and gold pieces, valuable both intrin-  
sically and for their rarity. The col-  
lection included a jubilee \$5 gold piece,  
a Canadian gold dollar, a "half spade"  
guinea of 1798, two 25 cent gold pieces,  
silver coins from \$1 to 2½ cents, coins  
from Tibet, Mexico, Honduras and  
various South American republics.  
The letter does not mention the value  
of the collection, but it must be con-  
siderable.
