John A's Will.

SOME OF THE PRINCIPLE FEATURES—
ESTATE WORTH NEARLY \$100,000.

The principal points in the last will
and testament of Sir John Macdonald
(dated September 4th, 1890) are made
public, and comprise the following
items: The executors are Hugh Macdonald,
Hon. Edgar Dewdney, F. White
and Joseph Pope. These gentlemen,
with Lady Macdonald, are the guar-
dians of his daughter. Earncliffe is
left to Lady Macdonald for life. It
may be sold, however, and the interest
on the proceeds used by her after which
it passes to the daughter and then to
the son. The law library passes to the
son, the other contents of the house
passing to his wife, together with cer-
tain investments. The proceeds of a
£2,000 policy are to be invested for his
and afterwards for the grandchildren.
The son also receives the moneys Sir
John received from the late Miss Macdonald.
As to half of the balance of
his personal estate he directs that the
income on it shall go to Lady Macdonald
and his daughter during the life
of both of them and to the survivors,
and as to the other half the income is
to go to the family of his son, and after
death of both Lady Macdonald and his
daughter the whole of his personal es-
tate is to go to the family of his son.
The value of the estate bequeathed,
apart from Earncliffe, is between \$80,
000 and \$90,000.

FIRE BUG.

On Saturday last a new union school
section was formed between Townsend
and Walpole to be known as S. S. No.
12. Walpole and 16 Townsend. The
arbitrators were Judge Robb, Dr. Wads-
worth and R. J. Somers of Norfolk and
C. Moses and J. Williamson of Haldimand.
A large amount of evidence
was taken showing the difficulties the
people of the vicinity have long felt
in educating their children. The problem
for the arbitrators was to form a new
section without unduly crippling those
already in existence. Mr. Couker, of
Cayuga, was retained by the Springvale
section to watch their interests. The
new section will contain nearly 3,000
acres, and has now over 70 children of
school age. The first school meeting
will be called by the Public School In-
spector of Norfolk at the close of the
year, and the section will then organize
and proceed to build next year.—
Reformer.

There are 6,250,000 Roman Catholics
in the United States.

Michael McHugh committed suicide
at Belleville on Monday.

The net balance in the United States
treasury now is \$51,501,871.

France is reported to be intriguing to
secure the annexation of Siam.

The powder works at Jermy, Pa.,
exploded Monday morning. Two men
were killed.

German explorers in West Africa
have met with serious repulses at the
hands of the natives.

The trouble between white and color-
ed miners in Washington Territory is
about settled.

Northwest Mounted Police captured
180 gallons contraband whisky at Re-
gina recently.

Three men were badly hurt in a
scaffold accident at St. Thomas on Sat-
urday. One may die.

Donald McLean a farmer near Luck-
now, Ont., was fatally injured at a barn
raising on Saturday.

Despatches from Hayti state that 200
persons were recently put to death there
by order of Hippolyte.

Germany is greatly pleased at the
magnificent reception accorded to the
Emperor on his arrival in England.

The body of Maitland Young, who
was drowned in Hamilton Bay on Sun-
day afternoon, has not been recovered
yet.

Forty cases of sunstroke occurred
among German troops at Weimar on
Friday and Saturday. Four have re-
sulted fatally.

Many convicts are reported killed in
a Louisiana penitentiary Monday
through the demolishing of the building
by a cyclone.

Twenty thousand pounds of tea were
emptied into the bay at San Francisco
on Saturday through the breaking loose
of a freight car.

J. L. Coleman, Dominion express
agent, has been arrested and committed
for trial at Smith's Falls charged with
embezzlement.

Judge Reilly, of Detroit, has delivered
judgment in the Bank of Montreal
against the J. E. Potts Salt and Lumber
Company, pronouncing the bank's claim
valid.

A despatch from Northfield, Minn.,
says there is likely to be a rupture in
the ranks of the Farmers' Alliance
owing to the perpetration of an out-
rageous swindle by the leaders.

This week six convicts are to be elec-
trocuted at Sing Sing. It appears the
newspaper men are more agitated over
the matter than the doomed men. The
prison officials withhold all information.

The steamer Dunholme, from Middles-
boro' for Rio Janeiro, collided with the
steamer Kinloch off Dover Monday
morning and sank in two minutes.
Seventeen passengers and crew are
missing.

Upwards of 300 delegates, embracing
clergymen and laymen, left New York
for Europe Thursday to attend the
world's international Congregational
convention to be held in London on the
14th inst. The delegates come from
all parts of the country.

The body of a heavy built man about
25 years of age was found by a couple
of Cornwall island Indians in the St.
Lawrence near Cornwall Monday. A
silver watch and gold chain, a two-foot
rule, some hinges and screws and an
empty pocket book were in the pockets.
No clue to his identity.

The latest "fad" is telling one's age
with a hair. It is not new, but an old
fad that has been revived, and it is
generally tried on a horse, the hair being
taken from the tail, although on human
beings it "works just as well." The
idea is this:—"Suspend a gold ring from
a piece of hair over half a glass of water,
and the ring will begin to swing to and
fro until it hits the sides of the glass.
It will strike the exact age of the horse,
or, if it be a person's hair, of the person
upon whose head it grew."

Dr. Oronhyatekha, the Supreme Chief
Ranger of the I. O. F., returned Friday
night from Edinburgh, where he was
highly honored by being elected Right
Worthy Grand Templar of the Royal
Templars of the World. He was met at
the Union station, Toronto, by a large
number of prominent Foresters and
temperance men, and heartily congrat-
ulated upon his elevation to the highest
position in the gift of the Royal Tem-
plars of the world. The doctor looks
well, and has been much benefited in
health by his trip.—Free Press, London.
